Draft Rejection Rate Lowest In Oregon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—(AP)—A selective service survey showed today that Oregon had the lowest draft rejection rate in the country—24.4 per cent. Washington stood fourth. Ranking next were Kansas, 25.4; Utah, 26.1; Washington, 28.2; and Idaho, 29.3.

The survey also showed that domestic help topped the list of draft registrants rejected for military duty after physical examinations.

The study, just completed, also reveals North and South Carolina and Arkansas led the states in the percentage of men disqualified.

Although the state-by-state figures are based on rejections from February through August 1943, the report as a whole is a 20 per cent sampling of reports on more than 9,000,000 registrants examined from April 1942 to January 1944.
