MEDICAL WAC.—She's needed more than ever now, with the army casualty list taking an upswing on the western front, and many wounded being sent home to military hospitals, says Gen. George Marshall.

Casualties Bring Medical WAC Call

With army casualty lists steadily increasing and because of the critical shortage of army nurses and technically trained medical department personnel, General George C. Marshall, chief of staff, U. S. army, has announced the start of a new and vigorous recruiting drive to enlist women for the newly-created women's army medical units for service at the army's 60 general hospitals in this country.

Women qualified for training as medical and surgical technicians, clerical workers and other skilled women are urgently needed to fill these hospital units to aid in the care and rehabilitation of returned soldiers and release able-bodied men from technical and administrative duties. It is stressed, More than 8,000 additional women are required for this purpose.

The plan is to assign a company

of 100 women to each of the 1,000-bed hospitals and an additional company of the same size for each additional 1,000 beds in the larger hospitals. These companies will be made up of medical and surgical technicians primarily, but will include some women of clerical skills and technicians in other fields, such as X-ray, laboratory and dental.

Medical and surgical technicians perform various duties in hospital wards and operating rooms assisting in the care of the sick, injured and wounded soldiers under the supervision of army doctors and nurses.

Under an accelerated training program prepared by the surgeon general's office, qualified women enlisted as medical and surgical technicians will be assigned to a hospital unit as students after six weeks of basic military training and six weeks at an enlisted technicians' school.

They will receive one month of applicatory training after assignment to the hospital. Upon satisfactory completion of this training, they will qualify as technicians with appropriate army ratings and will continue on duty at the place of their final training.

Casualties are being returned from overseas at the rate of 20,000 a month. The medical department load is therefore higher than it has ever been in the army's history. For this reason, the army has set up one all-WAC enlisted technicians' school at Wakarusa general hospital, Camp Atterbury, Ind., and has opened three other technicians' schools which had formerly been used to train men. These are Beaumont general hospital at El Paso, Tex.; Fitzsimons general at Denver, Colo., and Brooke general at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

He pointed out that the group will be of a different type from any in Eugene in that it will be a discussion group formed on a club basis, with a president, vice-president and other officers. Another different feature is that coffee and doughnuts will be served during the first 10 minutes of the meeting. Everyone will have a chance to take part in the club, Jasper said.

Discussions will be led by Mrs. Ross J. Griffith, whose husband is president of Northwest Christian college.

At the meetings the first 10 minutes will be followed by songs and devotional service, announcements and special reports, after which the discussion leader will launch the topic for the meeting. The group will carry on with the discussion from that point.

A group of this kind went over "in a big way" at the University Christian church in Seattle, Jasper said.

Appointment of Mrs. W. G. Williamson as director of student work for First Congregational church is announced by Rev. Wesley Goodson Nicholson, pastor. Among her responsibilities will be direction of the College Fireside which meets each Sunday at 8 p. m. in the Wheeler room of the church.

Mrs. Williamson, the former Mary Kay Crumbaker, is majoring in business administration at the University of Oregon. During four years as a discussion leader at the annual meetings of Oregon Older Girls' conference, she contacted the selected representatives of all Christian groups in the state of Oregon. For two years she was president of the Junior Epworth League, and for two years president of the Epworth League at First Methodist church, Eugene.

She was graduated in 1937 from University high school, where she was a member of the debate society, drama club, band, orchestra, glee club, and National Honor society. Mrs. Williamson was a Rainbow Girl, and a charter member of the first Sub Deb club in Eugene.

In 1939, while attending Whitman college at Walla Walla, Wash., she joined the Congregational church there, and, upon returning to Eugene, brought her letter to the local Congregational church. At Whitman she was one

of two girls selected for the college pep band, was active in YWCA, and president of the Independent Women her second semester. Upon her return to Eugene in February, 1941, she was treasurer of Mu of Mu Phi Epsilon at the University of Oregon.

After her marriage in Petersburg, Va., in 1941, Mrs. Williamson lived in the south, where her husband, Captain W. G. Williamson, was stationed prior to his present overseas assignment in Italy. In the south, she directed the choir of the Central Baptist church of Grenada, Miss.

She left her position as executive secretary in air corps supply at Memphis to return to Oregon last September.
