The Dumbarton Oaks plan for world peace will be the topic discussed by a University of Oregon symposium team Friday, Feb. 2, at Roosevelt high school in Eugene. Barbara Bozorth, Eugene, and Barbara Weisz of Medford will be the speakers. On Thursday, Feb. 1, a team, which included Pat McCormack of Banks, Mary Landry of Klamath Falls, and Karen Martin of Creswell, will appear at Roosevelt junior high and discuss post-war relations between the United States and Russia.

The symposium teams, which are appearing throughout the state at various public meetings, are sponsored by the division of speech and dramatic arts at the university. They are under the direction of Robert D. Clark, assistant professor of speech and dramatic arts. There are two teams which are trained to discuss the Dumbarton Oaks and Russian post-war relations problems.

Northwest Has Largest Stake In Rivers Bill

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The northwest has the biggest financial stake of any section in the new rivers and harbors bill.

Projects for the two states total \$113,490,000, or almost half of the bill's estimated \$382,000,000 first construction cost. Alaska's projects total another \$3,748,000.

Second largest project in the new bill is the Snake river improvement, estimated to cost \$58,625,000. Largest is the \$60,000,000 Alabama-Coosa river development in Georgia and Alabama.

Next largest item in the northwest budget is the Umatilla dam project, of which \$49,470,000 would be authorized.

There are nine projects in Oregon, seven in Washington, exclusive of eight on the Columbia and the Snake river development. One of the Columbia river projects is merely for the acquisition of Indian fishing grounds to replace those lost by construction of Bonneville dam. There are 12 projects in Alaska, largest of which is the \$2,731,000 development at Wrangell narrows.

River Navigation

The Snake river developments, originally calling for 10 dams, now provides merely for "such dams as are necessary, and open channel improvement" to provide slack water navigation through a nine-foot channel from the river mouth to Lewiston, Ida.

A brief summary of the northwest projects follows:

Oregon: Chetco river: jetties and dredging for stabilization of harbor, \$180,000.

Coquille river: 13 foot channel from the sea to one mile above Coquille lighthouse; \$2,000 annual maintenance only.

Umpqua river and harbor: 22-foot channel land turning basin at Gardiner mill, \$55,000; 10-foot channel from deep water to Winchester bay with turning basin, \$44,000.

Yaquina bay and harbor: 20-foot channel across the bar, 20-foot channel for two miles up river and turning basin, \$162,000.

Depoe bay: breakwater and 6-foot entrance channel with inner basin, \$214,000.

Salmon River

Salmon river: rock removal for 5-foot channel, \$5,000.

Bayocan peninsula: protective construction, \$120,000.

Willamette river: channel improvement for 6-foot depth to Santiam mouth and 5-foot to Albany with reconstruction and enlargement of Oregon City locks, \$3,600,000.

Saukum river (Oregon, Washington and Idaho): complete canalization to Lewiston, Ida., by construction of 10 locks and dams and open channel work between pools, \$58,625,000.

Columbia river at Bonneville: to acquire lands to replace Indian fishing grounds, \$50,000.

Columbia river and tributaries above Celilo falls to the mouth of the Snake river (Oregon, Washington): for 6-foot approach channel to site of port development at Arlington, Ore., \$39,000; removal of obstructions in channel between Snake river and Kennewick, Wash., for 6-foot approach channel to site of terminal development at Kennewick, \$30,000.

Columbia river: construction of Umatilla dam, \$49,470,000.

Columbia river at Camas, Wash.: turning basin for ocean-going vessels, \$45,000.

Columbia and lower Willamette: 8-foot channel from Columbia through old mouth of Cowlitz river for 3,000 feet upstream, \$12,000; auxiliary channel from Longview, Wash., port dock downstream past Weverhuesen Timber company plant to connection with main channel, \$81,000.

Civilians Hide In Catacombs At Houffalize

HOUFFALIZE, Belgium — (AP) — Whimpering women and children remained in a crowded catacomb beneath their ruined church, pleading for a doctor to treat their wounded and waiting until it was safe to emerge.

They symbolized the tragedy of the second German occupation of this once picturesque Ardennes village and the second liberation which left it a mass of rubble.

I climbed down two steep flights of stairs to reach the "black hole of Houffalize," a double cave connected by a stone archway so low I had to crawl to get from one room to the other.

The air was foul from too many people living together. Lining the walls were 75 persons, mostly old women and children, many of them with serious wounds.

As I circled the walls with a candle, murmured prayers came out of the shadows mixed with pleas in French for me to have the Americans send a doctor and medicine.

Father Georges, their pastor, said some of the old ones had been in the cave since Dec. 19 when the first American bombers came while others had been there the last three days and nights during the "hell of the artillery bombardment," which demolished or damaged every building in the village. Father Georges said 200 of the town's 1,300 population had been killed. The remainder, excepting those in the caves, were living in surrounding woods.

Pointing to one rubble pile after another Father Georges said: "There 76 were killed. Here 23 died. And over there a little girl who was burned in the fire screamed until she died."

JUNCTION CITY — James W. Stapleton, 93, died Tuesday at his home on route 1, Junction City near Alvadore. He was a native of Illinois, born March 24, 1851. He was married to Emily Ann Ready in Topeka, Kans., March 15, 1874, and they moved to Montana in 1893. They came to Alvadore 25 years ago, from Colorado. Mr. Stapleton was a member of the Christian church.

Surviving him are his wife; seven sons and daughters, Carl Stapleton of Alvadore; Mrs. Melissa Lemon of Junction City; Mrs. Anna Stoffel and Mrs. Belle Floetke, both of Portland; Mrs. Maude Huffine of Seattle; Luther Stapleton of Portland and Willie Stapleton of Vallejo, Calif.; 42 grandchildren; 53 great-grandchildren, and seven great-great-grandchildren.

Funeral services are to be announced through the Poole-Larsen mortuary.
