How the discharged veteran can secure a loan to build a home, start his own business, or buy machinery and livestock, will be explained by Rogers W. Kimberling of the First National Bank in Eugene at the Active club's noon luncheon, Thursday, Feb. 1.

Under the servicemen's readjustment act of 1944, commonly called the GI Bill of Rights, 50 per cent of a loan, but not in excess of \$2000, will be guaranteed by the government. Loans may be made through a bank, through government lending agencies, commercial loan companies or from an individual.

Roy Copping, president of the club, extends an invitation to all servicemen and discharged veterans who want information on the GI Bill of Rights. The luncheon will be held in the Eugene hotel.

Woman Sues Laundry For Crash Damages

Claiming \$11,250 damages for injuries allegedly received when a car in which she was riding and a delivery truck of the defendant collided, Clara E. Hook has filed suit in circuit court against the Domestic Laundry and Cleaners, Inc.

The plaintiff alleges that while riding as a guest in the car of Dr. L. S. Kent on the Siuslaw highway about 10 miles west of Cheshire Oct. 26, 1944, the car was struck by the truck and she suffered several injuries. She seeks \$10,000 general damages, \$1000 special damages and \$250 for medical services.

Coast Living Cost Advance Measured

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The cost of living advanced in Pacific coast cities up to Dec. 15, with Seattle's climbing 0.6 per cent in one month and Portland's 1.1 per cent in two, the U. S. department of labor's bureau of labor statistics reported yesterday. Los Angeles and San Francisco costs also increased.

Food costs led the advance, up 0.8 in Seattle and 2.9 in Portland. The all-item cost index, compared with the 1935-39 average, was 31.1 in Seattle and 33.3 in Portland, compared to a nationwide increase of 27 per cent.

Municipal Union Bill Disapproved

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 31.—(AP)—An automatic "kill" was dropped on a bill that would permit labor unions composed of employees of municipal corporations, yesterday, when the state senate labor and industries committee brought the bill to the floor with a "do not pass" recommendation.
