## Post-War Air Lanes Topic of U. O. Radio

What the post-war world can expect in the air lanes of the Pacific basin will be discussed Thursday night at 7:55 o'clock over the state-owned station KOAC on the weekly broadcast of the Pacific basin studies group at the University of Oregon, according to Dr. Harold J. Noble, chairman of the programs.

A. L. Lomax, professor of business administration, and William Green, graduate business administration student who is writing a paper on air transportation, will carry the burden of the discussion, with a yet-to-be named official from the Portland air lines helping with technical information when needed.

Title of the program is "Problems of the Pacific Islands" but the main topic will be air transportation, the policies of the different governments, the obstacles to be overcome and the probable future of this way of travel.

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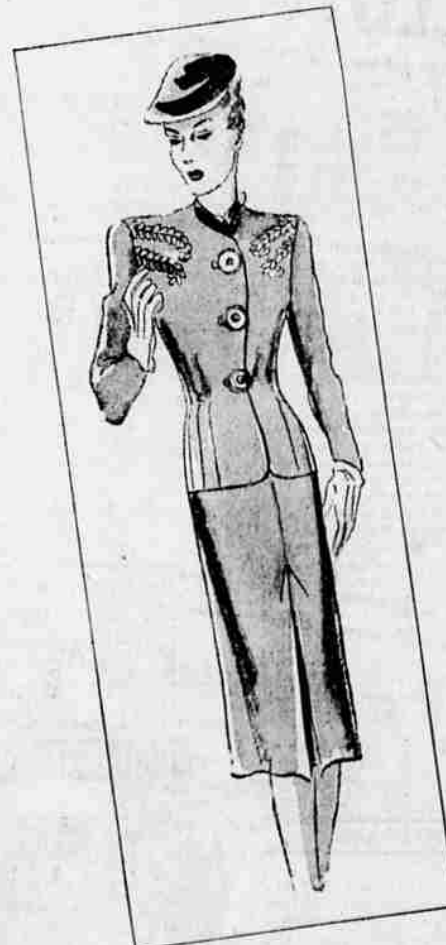
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
