Junior Red Cross Discusses War Fund

The third meeting of the Junior Red Cross was held Saturday afternoon at the Red Cross headquarters. Guest speaker was Ralph Kandler, assistant to William Lush, general chairman of the war fund committee. He told the representatives and teacher sponsors present that the war fund campaign would be held in March and that the schools would contribute voluntarily to it but would not be solicited or have a quota set as they were expected to enroll in Junior Red Cross in the fall and contribute to the Junior Red Cross service fund.

If Red Cross war fund money was raised it should be turned in to the Junior Red Cross, from which it would be designated to the war fund by the advisory committee of the Junior Red Cross, he said. The schools will be asked, however, to distribute war fund literature to adults.

New Curriculum Features Outlined

The establishment of a new curriculum, leading to the degree of bachelor of arts in basin liberal studies in the college of liberal arts of the University of Oregon, represents a departure from the free-elective system that has been traditional in American universities for many years. The new curriculum, presented to the state board of higher education by the faculty of the college of liberal arts and approved at the January meeting of the board, will become effective beginning with the academic year 1945-46. Effect of the new plan is to tighten scholastic requirements and present a course of study that will represent a broad cross-cut of cultural offerings from the various departments of the college.

The basic plan, as presented to the dean of the college of liberal arts, originally was formulated by a committee on degrees of which Dr. C. Valentine Boyer was chairman. Members of this committee included Dr. Quirinus Breen, Dr. R. R. Huestis, Dr. A. H. Kunz, and Dr. H. G. Townsend.

To Lay Foundation

The plan, after its adoption, was placed in the hands of an administrative committee of three faculty members of the college. These three, Dr. Townsend, chairman, Dr. J. T. Gano, and Dr. Pierre Van Rysselberghe, are in charge of the new curriculum. Under their direction the curriculum is designed to lay a substantial foundation for understanding the literature, science and history of civilization.

It does not change the already established curriculum of the college. Two plans of study, as already recognized, lead to the bachelor of science or bachelor of arts degree. These are a degree in one of the special curricula in use such as Pacific basin studies or general arts and letters, and a degree with a major in a single department of the college.

But the new curriculum for basic liberal studies does present a restricted elective system of obtaining a degree in the college and most of the student's work must be selected from a restricted list of courses. The list is printed in full in the annual catalogue.

Committee of Three

Administration of the new curriculum is by the committee of three, who have been appointed by the dean of the college of liberal arts. The members of this committee are the official advisers of all students in the curriculum. Changes in the curriculum may be made on the recommendation of the committee and approval by the college faculty. Substitutions in the printed curriculum may be made by the committee, however, when cancellation of some sort of a sequence by departments concerned makes such changes necessary.

Certification that the curriculum has been completed is made by the dean of the college of liberal arts.

Scholastic requirements for entrance to the college under the curriculum for basic liberal studies have been tightened. Any freshman students whose placement examinations or high school records rank them in the upper three deciles of their class are eligible for admission to the curriculum.

Eugene Bank Gains 35 Places In Rank Among Banks In 1944

The First National Bank of Eugene gained 35 places in its standing among the 14,500 banks in the United States during 1944, and now ranks as the 395th largest in size of deposits as compared with 430th at the end of 1943. This is revealed in the 1945 annual roll call of largest banks in the United States, published by the American Banker, the only daily banking newspaper, on Feb. 5.

During 1944, deposits of the bank rose from \$25,973,200 to \$34,806,211, an increase of \$8,833,011, the American Banker points out.
