Junior Red Cross is an enrollment program for service, not for money, and is one means of giving school children opportunity also to do their share in the Red Cross program of service. Junior Red Cross Busy Past 2 Months

Several additional schools have enrolled for Junior Red Cross work, including the following: Crown Point, McKenzie, Diston, Spencer Butte, and Blue Mountain grade schools, and Cottage Grove, McKenzie, and Loran high schools. During the month just passed, Elmira, Central, Stafford, and Mabel grade schools were added to the list with Eugene high school and The Cedars.

A total of 675 articles was contributed by the various schools in December, and during January 572 articles came into headquarters. Six high schools were producing: Woodrow Wilson Junior high, Pleasant Hill, Eugene high, University high, Springfield and Cottage Grove.

On the grade school list producing for those two months were Springfield Brattain; Edison at Eugene; Irving, Mohawk, Fiddle Creek, Chase Gardens, Willakenzie, Whiteaker, Fox Hollow, Pleasant Hill, Mapleton, Glenwood, Lincoln, Oak Grove, Frances Willard at Eugene, Mt. Carmel, Spencer Butte and Central.

Girl Scout troops at Lincoln, Theodore Roosevelt, Eugene and University high schools worked on the various projects, as did the Brownie troop of Stella Magladry school. Christmas gifts and favors were sent to the Corvallis farm home.

During January and December the following articles were shipped to area headquarters: 15 Braille books covered by Edison school; 100 educational and health gift boxes to foreign children; 50 crossword puzzles; 50 story books; 50 joke books; 50 Valentine place cards; 50 Washington birthday place cards; 200 Christmas cards; 28 pairs of slippers; 21 wooden puzzles; 18 lap boards; 12 trays; 12 writing boards.

Junior Red Cross members also contributed to the children's emergency closet, and a total of 175 articles to the ditty bag committee, including pocket editions, pencils, soap, razor blades, and life savers.

Old S. S. Bandon Doomed For Liens

PORTLAND, Feb. 6.—The S. S. Atravido, formerly known as the Bandon, has been ordered condemned and sold to satisfy liens in the amount of \$11,150 held by Sam Tompkins, Coos Bay, according to an order issued by Federal Judge James Alger Fee in district court here.

The vessel, which had been abandoned by its Mexican owner, has lain at a Coos Bay dock since August 1, 1943. Judge Fee ordered that all profits from the sale, in excess of the liens, be turned over to the owner.

Hood River Legion Stands Pat On Japs

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Feb. 6.—(AP)—The membership of Hood River American Legion post today had rejected the recommendation of the Legion's national commander that it restore the names of Japanese-American service men erased from the county's honor roll.

A statement said simply that the post "deems it inadvisable at this time to take any action." Post Cmdr. J. B. Edgington declined to amplify the announcement or discuss the vote.

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Japs Slowly Starved Civilians At Santo Tomas, Writer Says

EDITOR'S NOTE: Robert Crabb, a member of the former United Press staff in Manila, was interned at Santo Tomas university with his wife when the city fell in 1942. Two children, a daughter and a son, were born to the Crabbs during the internment. In this dispatch he describes how the Japanese systematically starved the allied civilian internees, now liberated by Yank cavalrymen.

SANTO TOMAS INTERNMENT CAMP, Manila, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The Japanese slowly starved the civilian internees of Santo Tomas after announcing that the rules of the Geneva convention and international law "are not recognized here."

Men, women and children suffering from malnutrition often heard food vendors crying their wares outside the walls. Many internees were unable to walk without stumbling. Cases of collapse became routine. People dropped unconscious on stairways, in halls, in show lines.

The starvation began last February when the Japanese army took over the camp and announced that army regulations would apply to the internees thereafter.

From that time on malnutrition dogged the camp. Before that we had been able to stave it off by outside purchase of food at high prices.

At that time we were getting an average of 1,500 calories daily. This dropped to 1,000 last November. In the last three weeks it fell to 700.

Many times during the past few months my daughter and I collected potato peelings and other vegetable peelings and boiled them to make broth.

Planted Banana Shoots
Fortunately I had planted a number of banana shoots around our shanty. These shoots provided us with bulk, if not nutrition, during the last two months.

The core of banana trees and roots were edible, although absolutely tasteless.

We have eaten our way through five trees, which had not reached the fruit-bearing stages.

The doses with which we used to fool our stomachs were almost incredible. We ate every meal with teaspoons while reading the most difficult books we could find. This made the interval before the next meal as short as possible.

We lived in a shanty I built myself on the grounds. It was only 10 by 10 feet. There we cooked, ate, slept and rested. We left it as little as possible in order to preserve our strength.

About half the people in the camp have swollen joints and know the advancing stages of malnutrition.

Dr. Theodore B. Stevenson of the camp medical staff was jailed by the Japs for insisting on including the word "malnutrition" on death certificates.

Born In Internment
Our daughter was born in internment.
