County Cash Total Above \$1,300,000

Total Lane county cash on hand
and county funds invested as of
Dec. 31, 1944, amounted to \$1,-
391,359.15. It is revealed in a sum-
mary of balances released Wed-
nesday by Grace Schiska, county
treasurer. Of this sum, \$1,142,-
665.15 is cash on hand and \$248,-
694 in investments.

Treasurer Schiska said that this
is a little larger than the balance
on hand on the same date the
year previous. This is accounted
for by the prompt payment of
property taxes. The summary of

Court Turns Down Road Near Veneta

At the monthly road meeting of
the county court Wednesday a
petition that the county take over
a road in the Dalton Poultry
Farms plat at Veneta was denied
when the viewers made an ad-
verse report upon it.

The viewers said they did not
think the road would benefit
enough people to warrant making
it a county thoroughfare.

The court ordered that the
county take over as a road a strip
of land along the east side of the
S.E. right of way in the northern
part of Cottage Grove.

The court carried over for 30
days the petition to vacate some
of the streets in the plat of Lake
Creek at the Bear Creek station
west of Junction City, as there
were some objections on the part
of property owners.

Easements were granted the
Lane County Electric Co-op for
its lines over the reconstructed
market road in the Dorena dam
area east of Cottage Grove.

Larsen mortuary.

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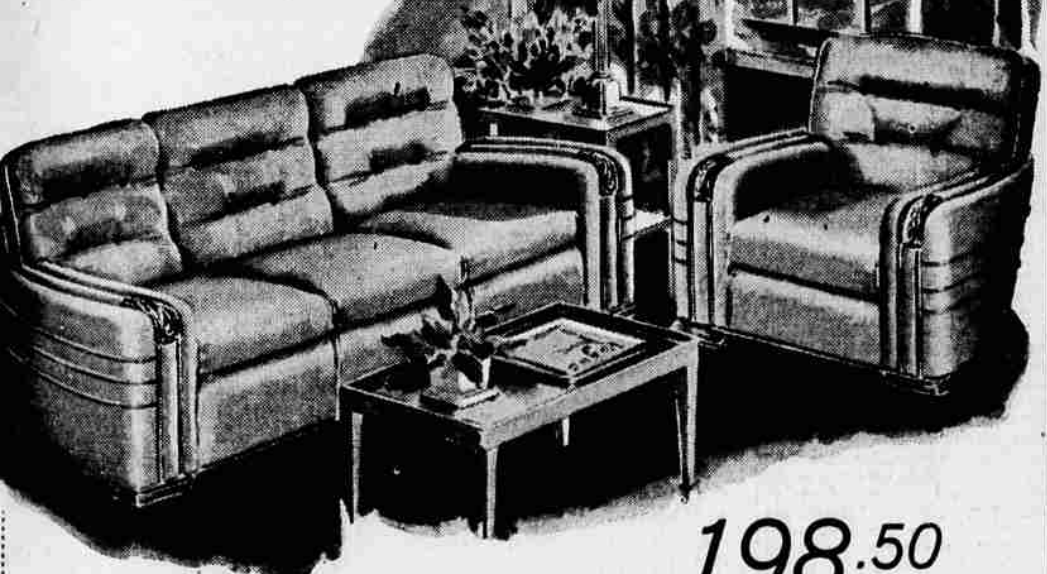
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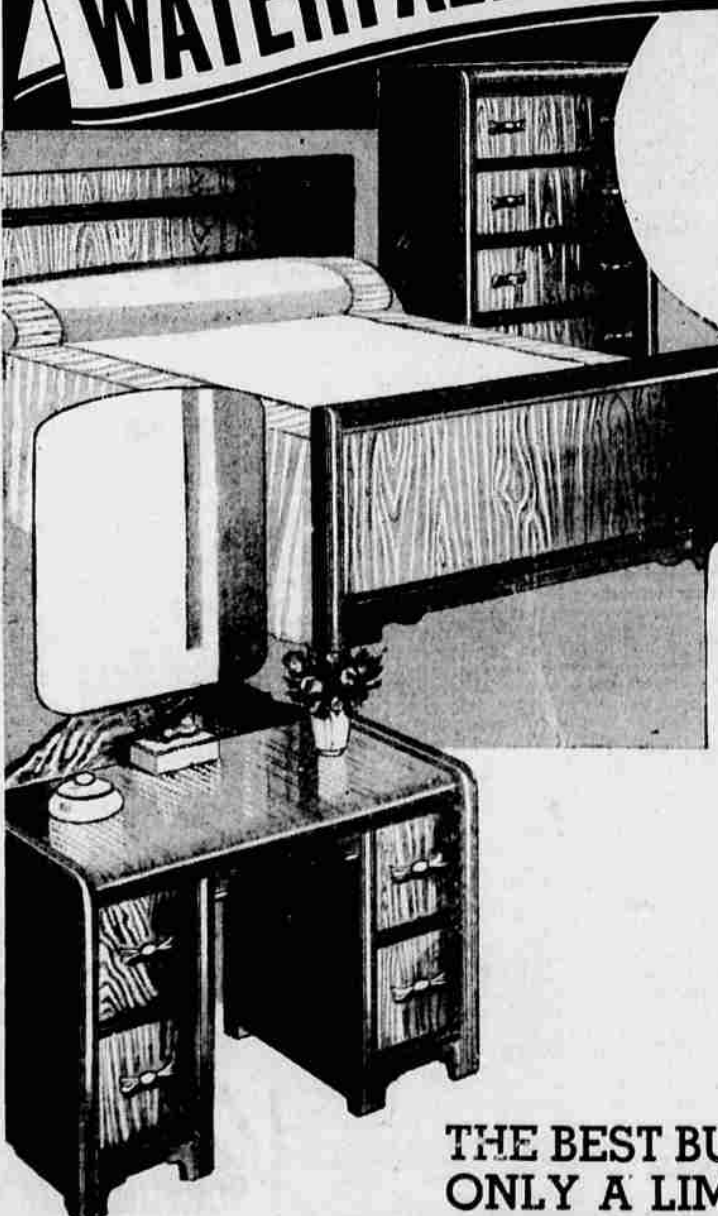
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
