

MATTHEW'S GOSPEL RECORDS:

"While he was yet speaking, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them; and behold, a voice out of the cloud saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him" (Matt. 17:3). This verse of scripture is taken from the account of the transfiguration of our Lord. In this age we are to hear Christ. "God, having of old time spoken unto the fathers in the prophets by divers portions and in divers manners, hath at the end of these days spoken unto us in His Son" (Heb. 1:1-2). Abraham, Moses, David, etc., are not spokesmen for God. The Son of God speaks to us.

Where in the Bible do we find the message of the Son? Where does he give his plan of salvation? Certainly he does not give us his will in the Old Testament. "He taketh the first (covenant or testament), that he may establish the second" (Heb. 10:9). Christ took away the Old Testament to set in order the new (Heb. 8:13). He removed it by his death on the cross (Col. 3:14-17). Strange, isn't it, that so many of the religious practices of the day are justified by a law that has been removed. Is it not by the authority of Moses that many today remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy? Indeed, it is Christ never commanded anyone to keep the Sabbath Day in his will.

The new covenant or Christ's will is found in only one book in actual operation, making saints out of sinners. The book is not one of the first four of the New Testament. Christ's testament was not in force until after he died. "For a testament is in force after men are dead; otherwise it is of no strength at all while the testator liveth" (Heb. 9:16-17). It is not one of the books from Romans through Revelations. These books are written to saints—those who have been saved through Christ's will. This one book is Acts of Apostles. We have no less than eight accounts of Christ's work in actual operation in making saints out of sinners. We beg you to turn and study these passages: Acts 2:1-47; 4:1-24; 13:16-40; 17:1-34; 18:1-11; 18:12-15; 18:25-28; 19:1-40.

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Planning Meet Set

The city planning commission is to hold a hearing Tuesday evening, Feb. 20, at 7:30 o'clock on three proposals for zoning and set-back changes. The commission was instructed by the city council at its Monday meeting to adopt a tentative report, hold the hearing and make a final report and recommendation to the council.

The proposed changes would include: reclassifying lots 8, 9 and 10, block 24, Packard's addition from single family residence to business district; changing classification of the east 52.8 feet of lot 19 and west 81.76 feet of lot 18, Horn's addition, from a residence zone to a business district; extending setback lines in 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 11th and 13th Avenues west through the territory recently annexed to the city.

4-H Club Week

Plans are being made by E. A. Danielson, county club leader and members of 4-H clubs all over Lane county to observe national 4-H club week March 3 to 11 inclusive.

The purpose of the observance of this week is to provide 4-H club members an opportunity to check up on their own efforts to date in helping to win the war, to give every member an opportunity to re-dedicate himself to the task ahead, and to reaffirm his intention to carry his 1945 goals to completion.

National 4-H club week has been celebrated by clubs at this time for the year for a number of years past. There are a number of things that a club can do during this week, the first thing, Danielson advises, being to appoint a committee to work out plans. This committee may be the officers of the club or a special committee, if the club may desire.

The club leader has received at his office a ceremony to be used when new members are taken in. He says that if there are any boys and girls in any community where a club is located who are not members and who want to join, this ceremony can be used.

Survey Shows R. R. Canteens' Value

Just back from a business trip to Chicago, a representative of the Eugene Junior chamber of commerce Saturday reported on operation of USO canteens, set up in railroad stations from Portland to Illinois.

"We began hearing about the canteens as the train approached the towns in which they were located," he said. "Boys who had traveled the route before and military and shore police told the other fellows where they would be able to get coffee, sandwiches, cookies and other eatables. So, when the train stopped the men and women in uniform headed straight for the canteen."

The traveler observed USO canteens at Portland, Pendleton, Boise, Idaho, Cheyenne, Wyo., North Platte and Omaha, Neb., and Chicago, and took particularly close notice of the installation at Pocatello, Idaho, where he had the longest stop-over and best opportunity.

"They operate on an 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. daily schedule," he reported, "and try to keep at least eight people on duty on each of three shifts. Frequently, however, they have to handle the rush with less. There were about 400 servicemen on our train, and I estimate that about 85 per cent of them entered the canteen for service."

The building was only about 50 by 12 feet, yet all the men were served. Remarkably enough, they seemed automatically to line up, and all were taken care of in orderly fashion. The "hut," as it is called, has different things in different sections; hot chocolate and cookies in one corner, sandwiches, coffee and other eatables in other parts of the room. When cigarettes are obtainable, they are put out in bulk, and the men help themselves, taking from one to three of them. There was no waste of food or cigarettes; everyone took just what he wanted at the moment.

Canteen Big Help
Men trying to get home for a short furlough usually are traveling on a strictly limited budget, and find the canteens a big help, he found.

The Pocatello USO Hut serves from 1000 to 1500 daily, and Mrs. Edna Service, director, estimated that 681,000 were served last year. Its work was started February 16, 1942, when the American Legion auxiliary in Pocatello began serving food and cigarettes and providing magazines for the men.

From that beginning, the "hut" has expanded until a large part of southeastern Idaho is cooperating, and now about 52 organizations throughout that part of the state are assisting with its operation.

In addition to food, the hut offers various services to the men, including shaving equipment, pressing and ironing, sewing on buttons, and providing magazines, games, lighter fluid, stationery, ink, cigarettes, matches, even toothpicks.

All the canteens he observed are handled very much the same way, the representative said.

Lt. Col. Wiper Ends Missions, Returns Home



Young Tom Wiper is now an old army man of six years' experience, and with rank as lieutenant colonel. With 50 combat missions to his credit, and with the distinguished flying cross, the air medal with several clusters—he wears two, and doesn't admit how many—and with two battle stars ribbon for invasion of southern France, he is back from ten months' overseas duty to visit at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wiper, 2111 University street. With him are his wife and son, Tom, Jr.

Little Tom was just trying to take his first step when the family visited here last March, before the then major departed for abroad. Now nearing two years, Tom, Jr., walks and runs as well as anyone, but as yet lacks words to express himself. He manages, however, to convey that he considers himself the man of the house and his mother's special guardian, and that to his mind fathers still are people he can do without. Mrs. Wiper has been making her residence in Portland in the past year, with frequent visits to Eugene. She did not meet her husband at the east coast, as he brought a troop train across country.

Leaving the States about April 1 of last year, Colonel Wiper went first to Africa, and after a few weeks, to Italy. He started flying in June, soon after the first of the shuttle-bombing flights from Russia. He was not engaged in these missions, however, which were made by the eighth air force; his station was with the 15th air force, which did strategic bombing. Colonel Wiper was a group leader for B-17's. They addressed their efforts to oil refineries, manufacturing and industrial centers, railroads and marshalling yards.

The colonel's DFC award carried a narrative citation, kept by his mother, which states "on August 27, 1944, when the 99th bombardment group was assigned to attack and destroy vitally important synthetic oil refineries in Germany, to eradicate oil reserves in enemy hands, Major Thomas L. Wiper was flying as pilot of a B-17 aircraft, leading his entire group. He led his formations along the plotted course, avoiding heavily defended areas; held the formation together to present concentrated fire power against fighter attacks; despite intense anti-aircraft fire and a smoke screen obscuring the view at high altitude, he identified the target, headed his units directly over the objective and scored many hits; maneuvered planes on the home-ward flight to protect those damaged in the mission and returned them to the base without loss of crew members."

With 21 days at his disposal, a third of which already has been passed here, the officer plans to spend a few days in Portland, several more at Canyonville, and eventually will report at Santa Monica, Calif., for reassignment.

Commissioned a second lieutenant in infantry in ROTC at the University of Oregon in 1939, when he was graduated, Wiper transferred in 1940 to the army air corps. His commission remained inactive while he was a cadet, pioneering at several air fields. He resumed active duty in March, 1941, and was for a time an instructor at Moffett field in California. He was advanced to first lieutenant in October, 1941, at the time of his marriage to Miss Billie Johnson of Portland.

The lieutenant colonel plans to make the army his career, and hopes—but that's a military secret, isn't it?
