## Rent Signup Spread

Arrangements for the signup of landlords in outlying towns of Lane county under the OPA rent control program were being made Friday by Wendell "Scottie" Stuart, rent representative for this area, and Sam Cox, inspector-examiner. It was announced by Don C. Wilson, assistant rent control director for this area.

It is expected that this registration will start about March 5. Stuart and Cox were at Oakridge and Springfield Friday, making arrangements for quarters in which the signup will take place. Other towns in which similar arrangements will be made are Cottage Grove, Junction City, Swisshome, Mapleton and Florence. Hours for registration will be 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Stuart and Cox are merely making arrangements for the signup, and are not signing up landlords yet. Definite dates for registration in the various towns will be announced later, Wilson said. He pointed out that by sending staff members to those communities considerable travel will be saved for the landlords affected.

On Saturday Stuart and Cox will be in Cottage Grove and Florence.

## \$4900 Damage Suit Filed

Suit for \$4900.06 damages on account of injuries allegedly received in a car collision has been filed in circuit court by Charles Mizera against Merle H. Wolf.

The plaintiff alleges that on May 15, 1944, a car being driven by the defendant collided with a car occupied by him at the intersection of Franklin boulevard and Walnut street in Eugene.

He seeks \$3500 general damages, \$500 for hospital care and medical attention and \$900.06 for loss of earnings. Besides, he is asking for \$73.97 as costs of the suit.

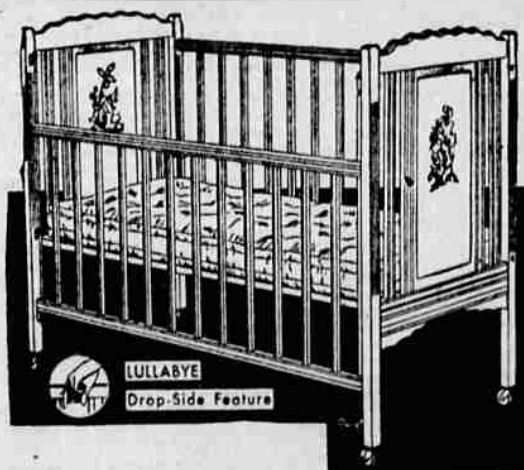

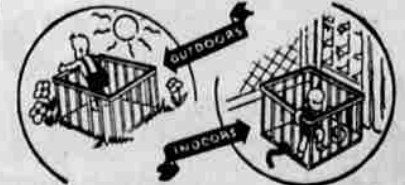
