

Arnold Promises Super-Superforts

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP)—If the residents of off-bombed Tokyo think the B-29 is a tough baby, they ought to see what the army is cooking up now.

Gen. Henry H. Arnold, commander of the army air forces, revealed officially today that three new types of bombers being developed are even more deadly than the superfortresses now

General Watson Dies

ABOARD PRESIDENTIAL CRUISER IN THE ATLANTIC, Feb. 26.—(AP)—(Delayed)—Major Gen. Edwin M. Watson, the man who made President Roosevelt's official appointments, died at sea today on the way home from the Crimea conference.

General Watson was 61. A cerebral hemorrhage caused the death of the presidential secretary and military aide.

Expressing his great personal sorrow at the loss of a "close friend and associate," Mr. Roosevelt said it was Watson's "sense of duty and determination to see the war through that made him insist on taking this trip with me."

Smokes, Property May See More Tax

SALEM, Feb. 27.—(AP)—A five-mill property tax and an additional tax on cigarettes appeared a possibility in Oregon today, following the decision of the joint legislative ways and means committee to give "do pass" recommendations to the plans.

The money, an estimated \$14,000,000 for the biennium, would go for school and institutional support.

The potent financial committee also decided that schools should get a total of \$8,000,000 of surplus income tax money. At present they get \$5,000,000.

Of the total amount raised the expected \$10,000,000 raised by the property tax during the biennium, plus the \$2,000,000 yearly from tobacco, would go for the building program of the state board of higher education, institutional building, and needy school districts.

The tobacco tax, of two cents on a cigarette package, was defeated recently by Oregon voters. It would be on a permanent basis, although the property tax levy would be for two years only.

Both proposals would have to go before the people for support by popular vote, and a referendum clause is attached. Sen. Dean Walker, Independence, chairman of the senate ways and means committee, originated the suggestions.

Kerensky Here For Series Of Lectures

Alexander Kerensky, Russian military leader of World War I and pre-revolutionary statesman of that country, arrived in Eugene Tuesday for a two-day series of lectures on the University of Oregon campus, for students and faculty.

Reputed organizer of the Russian revolution, and later superseded by the Bolsheviks, and exiled from Russia, Kerensky has written two widely read books on the revolution, "Prelude to Bolshevism" and "Crucifixion of Liberty."

He has been in America since 1938, and now is working toward post-war Russian cooperation.

Appearing here on the university lecture series, he will speak at 7:30 this evening (Tuesday) to students and faculty in the auditorium of the music building, his subject, "Russia and the International Situation."

Portable Classrooms Planned

Erection of 6 to 10 portable classroom units to relieve overcrowding in Eugene elementary schools, as a temporary measure, is being considered by the school board.

The portable units would be used only until permanent facilities could be provided. Models of suggested portable units will be made by Art Clough, instructor in creative design at Eugene vocational school, and Ray Cornelius, woodworking instructor at EVS, and will be exhibited at the board's next meeting, March 12.

Max Dudley, president of the Edison P-TA, told the board it is expected the Edison school will have 52 first graders next fall, and 40 additional children, as a result of new home building. The increase would make two additional classrooms advisable, it was pointed out.

The board extended for one year the leave of absence of Opal Woodson, fourth grade teacher at Edison, so she can continue work as price clerk in the OPA office.

The leave of absence of Thelma Sunrud, third grade teacher at Lincoln, was extended, because of illness, for one year.

Dispatchers all along the line make every effort to keep hospital trains rolling with the fewest possible stops.

Schedules are worked out in advance. On movements where some of the wounded are assigned to different hospitals, a car or cars will be detached at junction points. These cars will then be attached to regular trains for movement to other hospitals.

Southern Pacific is keenly aware of its great responsibility in moving the wounded. Every skill is brought into play to operate hospital trains smoothly, efficiently and on time.

These are Southern Pacific's most important trains.

Many of the less critically wounded travel on our regular trains. So if you find it difficult to secure a Pullman reservation, even for essential travel, it may be because some wounded man is occupying the space that otherwise might have been given to you. We know you'll agree these reservations are more urgent than yours.

We thought you would be interested in knowing of the care our returning wounded receive on hospital trains.

This is the procedure. We are asked by the Army or Navy to make up a hospital train with various types of cars. We assemble the cars, sometimes from distant points. The cars are inspected, thoroughly cleaned and pre-heated.

The train is then moved to the hospital receiving station where the wounded are carefully taken aboard.

When the train pulls out, a Train Commander—a commissioned medical officer—is in charge. To assist him, we assign an experienced railroad representative to accompany the train. On board, too, are Army or Navy nurses and enlisted medical corpsmen who expertly care for the wounded, night and day.

En route, the engineers, firemen, conductors, brakemen—all the trainmen—are thinking of every man aboard. They know that sudden starts and stops can cause discomfort to the wounded. That is why they try to handle these hospital trains extra gently.
