Wage And Hour Law To Be Explained Here

The wage and hour law will be interpreted for Eugene businessmen by Ray Jewell, wage stabilization director, 12th regional war labor board, Seattle, and Charles H. Elrey, branch manager of the wage and hour division, United States department of labor, Portland, at a meeting of the retail merchants division of the Eugene chamber of commerce here Friday.

Some 300 invitations have been sent to retailers in this area, V. Edwin Johnson, chairman of the retail division, said Thursday. The guest speakers have agreed to answer questions of local businessmen on all wage ceilings and related problems, Johnson said. The meeting is scheduled for noon Friday, Mar. 2, at the Eugene hotel.

City Building Permits At \$134,038 For 1945

Eugene building permits for February totaled \$38,485, bringing the total for the year so far to \$134,038. It was announced Thursday by S. R. Mosher, building inspector.

Permits for the first two months of 1944 were \$13,504.

There were 52 individual permits in February, including four for new residences, costing \$15,700, Mosher said. Thirty-nine of the permits were for repairs costing \$21,395. In addition to the residences there were nine other permits for new construction costing \$1400.
