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Mrs. Underwood in Piano Recital

Aurora Potter Underwood, pian-
ist, will be presented in recital by
the University of Oregon school of
music, at the auditorium, Monday
evening at 8 o'clock.

Works of four composers are in-
cluded in her program. Scarlatti,
Beethoven, Debussy and Chopin.
Scarlatti, a famous harpsichord
player in the days before the mod-
ern piano, is represented by two
numbers, "Sonata in B Minor" and
"Sonata in F Minor." Although
listed as sonatas, they are shorter
than the present form of sonata.
Scarlatti's work often is compared
to Bach and Handel of the same
period.

A complete Beethoven sonata,
Opus 31, No. 3, which is written
in the later form, and comprises
four movements, is her third num-
ber. This was written in the early
days of the artist's composing, be-
fore deafness had affected him,
and is bright and gay in his early
manner.

Three preludes by Debussy are
typical of the French impression-
ist and his style of "painting with
tone." The first, "Wind on the
Plain," has the sighing of the
wind, interrupted by stormy gusts;
the second, "Minstrels," is a bit
of musical irony and satire, sim-
ilar to the songs of Pagliacci, the
unhappy clown; the third, "The
Enchanted Cathedral," is a tonal
picture of a cathedral in the fog,
its chiming ringing through as the
fog lifts.

Fourth and closing group is de-
voted to four numbers by Chopin,
presenting some of his varied
styles. The first is a grouping of
three preludes, Opus 28, Nos. 22,
23 and 24; the second is his "Im-
promptu," Opus 51; the third,
called "Winter Wind Etude," is
Opus 25, No. 11; the closing
number, one of his more romantic
works, "Ballade," Opus 52.

of "blue chip" stocks and most com-

Low-quoted securities sold off slightly
on fair-sized volume after the opening.
Liquidation here apparently being due to
the elimination or stiffening of margins
announced by the stock exchange after
Saturday's close.
Investors with idle cash then began to
bid for higher grade issues and, while
actively blackened, gains running to 2 or
more points were well distributed at the
close. Top marks were trimmed here and

there near the finish.
Transfers approximated 1,200,000 shares.
Demand again was based on inflation
thinking, earnings and dividends.
Prominent on the upside were U. S.
Steel, Bethlehem, Youngtown Sheet,
Chrysler, Southern Pacific, Southern
Railway, Baltimore & Ohio, Chesapeake
& Ohio, Chicago & Northwester, Stand-
ard Gas & Electric, Safeway Stores,

poration, American Water Works,
Aviation Corp., Somooy and North Amer-
ican.
