

School Merger Pro And Con In Garden Way And Willagillespie

Summaries are presented below showing the arguments for and against the merger in reference to these districts.

Willagillespie

Willagillespie district is one of the largest in the city, and one which not only has a large population but also the prospect of rapid future growth. The district is situated in the northwestern part of the city, and according to Dr. Huffaker, who has made a survey of the housing situation, it is pointed out that the Willagillespie school, which is not more than 75 years old, has approximately 94. Willagillespie's school population has increased 50 to 60 per cent in the past 15 years. The assessed valuation, \$218,652. Levy, 14.2 mills. Property valuation per child, \$3800.

Amount of local contribution would be lost because the district would be governed by the city board. Dr. Huffaker has pointed out that there would be a loss of control through the city board. There are more than 15 members in the city board, where there are only seven board members. Transportation would have to be provided somehow and it is pointed out that 20 students would have to be transported. This is a problem for all suburban districts that are waiting until after the war to build housing problem.

Maple-Springfield Merger Approved

Maple and Springfield districts have decided to merge. At elections Monday, Maple voted 26 to 7 in favor of the merger, while Springfield voted 20 to 0. At its meeting next week the city board will consider the transfer. There are 16 seventh graders at Maple who would be transferred to Springfield. The transfer was made immediately. Eighteen Maple eighth graders now attend school in Springfield. The Maple school has an average daily attendance of 111.4. Questions to be decided include the transfer of students will be made, whether new construction will be necessary or whether the present Maple school will continue in use. Overcrowding of two schools in the Maple school district is relieved somewhat by the transfer of the seventh graders.

SALEM — (Special) — Naming Charles E. New Stop Signs

Night drivers in Eugene should have no trouble in noticing stop signs in the future. They're going to be larger—and the words will be brightly illuminated.

First street where the new signs will be installed is Eleventh. City Manager Deane Seeger has announced purchase of 50 new signs, 24 by 24 inches, which will be installed at 25 intersections on Eleventh avenue. Material used for lettering throws back headlight beams so that no driver should fail to see the warnings, Seeger said.

Similar signs will be installed on other through streets later.

Seeger said he is making a survey of the city to discover where accidents occur most frequently, with a view to placing the same illuminated type of "Slow" and "Speed Limit" signs at these spots to help reduce traffic hazards.

There is every indication that speed is an important factor in causing accidents, Seeger said, pointing out that these modern signs plus careful enforcement of traffic regulations will help curb accidents and will be an additional aid to drivers.

Group Thanks Cordon

A resolution, expressing "grateful thanks" to Sen. Guy Cordon for his action in voting against the appointment of Henry A. Wallace for the post of secretary of commerce, was passed at the meeting Saturday by the Lane county unit of Pro America for republican women. The resolution is as follows:

"Whereas: Sen. Guy Cordon, the senior United States senator from Oregon, by his vote against the confirmation of Henry Wallace as secretary of commerce, has protested against the president's method of paying a political debt by cabinet appointment without considering the fitness or qualifications of the candidate;

"And Whereas: Wallace's limitations were so generally recognized that it was necessary for congress to pass legislation limiting the powers of the secretary of commerce before the senate dared ratify the appointment;

"And Whereas: Mr. Wallace heads a radical element which openly professes to consider our constitution as inadequate and revolution as a possibility in changing it;

"Now, Therefore: Lane county unit of Pro America extends grateful thanks to Guy Cordon for his alert recognition of this situation and of the grave danger involved in the type of leadership which Henry Wallace advocates and represents; and Lane county unit of Pro America hereby expresses approval of Guy Cordon's vote which was recorded against the appointment of Henry Wallace."
