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Phi Beta Concert

Dr. Arnold Elston, assistant professor of music, and 28 students of the University of Oregon school of music, received ovation Tuesday night from an appreciative audience at a recital of contemporary music from scores contributed to the school's library by Phi Beta, women's national professional music and drama honorary.

Lois Roeder of Portland opened the program with two organ selections, Ricerare and Toccata by Jakob Froberger. The stately quality of these organ numbers was contrasted with the tempestuous "Rage Over a Lost Penny," written by Beethoven and played by Maxine Cady of Beaverton.

Emily Rhodes of Eugene presented still another contrast with the fourth movement from the suite for piano by Bela Bartok. The number created an ethereal atmosphere, seemingly leaving its listeners in mid-air for a few seconds after its finish.

Pieces for children, A Fairy Tale, Waltz, Rainbow and the Rain, and March, written by Prokofiev, were brief excursions into a fantasy world. Miss Killman executed them with an imaginative touch suggesting of a story teller in the midst of a group of eager children.

Puettino Concertante by Busoni imitated the style of Mozart and was played brilliantly at two pianos by Louise Robson of Shedd and Betty Jean Taylor of Eugene.

Mrs. Marion Cole of Eugene, soprano, performed two compositions of Hugo Wolf, Verschwiegene Liebe and Nachtzauber, undetectable in their modern rhythms and modulations. Miss Taylor was accompanist.

The first movement from the sonata for violin and piano by Aaron Copland was played by Marilyn Olson of Everett, Wash., who displayed artistry in interpreting the number composed of many harmonies and clear tones. Julia Wynn of Eugene displayed equal skill in execution of the sonata for clarinet by Paul Hindemith. Miss Olson was accompanied by Miss Patricia Metcalf of Corvallis, and Miss Wynn by Miss Johnette King of North Bend.

A group of modern choral selections completed the program. One was a motet, "There is a Way of Life," written by Dr. Elston in memory of the late Donald M. Erb, former University of Oregon president, received enthusiastic applause.
