Union Head Speaks

The musicians union's side in the recent controversy over royalties from phonograph records for the union was outlined briefly by Herman Kenin, Portland attorney and president of the musicians' union in Portland, for the Kiwanis club program Monday.

The heart of the issue for the union was whether or not the union could allow continued misuse and displacement of its services by all concerns using records, Kenin said. Kenin also is a board member of the American Federation of Musicians.

One thing that should have been done was to have informed the public in advance of what the union sought, the speaker said. All of the industries using records knew what was coming, and the federation waited 12 months after setting up its plan in convention to put the ban in force, he added in discussing the move by the musicians to refuse to let its members to continue making recordings until the problems involved had come to some solution.

Speaking of James Caesar Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, Kenin said he is a very vigorous person and an honest one—"one who could not and would not be bought out by anyone." The union has been back of Petrillo's effort to protect use of records made by the union musicians and set up some kind of a control that gives some such protection, Kenin said.

Speaking of comments of some as to what the union would do with all the money accumulating with the royalties, Kenin said there will not be the millions many like to think there will be. Whatever sum there is it can not be touched by anyone until action is taken at the next convention of the federation, and Kenin expressed the view the money would be used in subsidizing musical and cultural interests in communities throughout the country.

Kenin answered questions from Kiwanians following his talk.
