

## Water Board Plans \$17,000 Payment

The Eugene water board on April 1 will pay off \$17,000 of the principal of one power bond issue and \$1035 in interest, it was announced Tuesday by J. W. McArthur, superintendent, following a meeting of the board Monday night. The payment, with others made in the past, will whittle the original \$400,000 issue down to \$280,000.

Of another \$200,000 power bond issue \$149,000 in principal remains to be paid, McArthur said.

An analysis of the water board's investment was presented to the board by McArthur. It shows a gradual shift in investments from municipal to government bonds, the latter now accounting for 51.65 per cent of total bond investments.

McArthur was authorized to seek bids on gasoline for the board's equipment, its present contract expiring April 3.

Ordering of new water pipe was discussed, in view of needs for additional service in some areas, including the Chambers-Westmoreland section recently annexed. During the past winter 2000 feet of water pipe have been laid, McArthur said.

## \$30,000 Damage Suit Goes To The Jury

After a trial that lasted more than two days, the damage case of Duane Wheeler against John Edmiston, Rena Edmiston and John S. Schofield was expected to go to the jury early Tuesday afternoon. The trial was started Friday.

The plaintiff sued for \$30,000 damages on account of injuries allegedly received in a car collision at the intersection of Thirtieth Avenue east and A. G. A. street in Eugene July 25, 1942.

## Montana Convict Returned To Prison

Clarence A. Perry, arrested as a burglary suspect at Florence a few days ago, is on the way back to Deer Lodge, Montana, where he escaped from the state prison Feb. 20.

J. E. Henry, warden, accompanied by a guard at the Montana institution, arrived here last night and started back with their prisoner Tuesday forenoon.

Perry was serving a sentence in Montana on a bad check charge, the officers from there stated.

## Dr. Rosalind Wulzen On U. O. Lecture Series

"A very competent physiologist, a careful worker, and one who is highly original," were the words used by Dr. A. R. Moore, research professor of general physiology at the University of Oregon, to describe Dr. Rosalind Wulzen who will speak in room 12, Friendly hall Thursday at 7:30 p. m. on the University Lecture series.

Dr. Wulzen, associate professor of zoology at Oregon State college, will discuss the "antirheumatic" factor necessary in food to prevent accumulation of calcium in one's joints. Discovery of the necessity of this factor was made by Dr. Wulzen when she was assistant professor of animal biology at the U. of O. from 1928 to 1934. The factor, found in the cream of raw milk, has helped cure arthritis.

## Fighting Yanks Uphold Nisei, Says Johnston

With the comment that American troops fighting the enemy Japanese in the Pacific do not appreciate ill-treatment of the nisei, or loyal Japanese-Americans, at home, Richard W. (Dick) Johnston, United Press war correspondent, in a talk for the local Rotary club Tuesday, made a special plea that we "do not lose the war at home" by giving into practices that are against American constitution and the American way of life.

Combat troops know these nisei and their work, they are splendid soldiers and have done much to help the Americans in their gains through the Pacific, Johnston said, adding, as good soldiers and good Americans these nisei should be given their proper recognition and rights at home.

Also, Johnston gave special praise to the American Red Cross. "I am happy to say I have been soothed by the Red Cross at home to make favorable comments, but I want to say something in behalf of the Red Cross because I have observed the fine work it is doing in the Pacific," Johnston said. He spoke specifically of the plane and whole blood being sent out to combat troops and told of the many, many lives this blood has saved.

As he had pointed out in other talks and news stories, Johnston again stressed the necessity of cleaning out the Japanese military. "Until we eliminate all the military in Japan, so imbued with fanatical desire to die for the emperor and to attain rights in 'heaven' at the Yasukuni shrine; and until we also, do away with the source or fountainhead of that fanatical goal—the emperor—we will find it difficult to live on with the Japanese. Unless we smash them thoroughly and refuse to have any negotiated peace, we can make up our minds we shall be fighting the Japanese again in another 40 years," Johnston said.

Again, he said he believed a long struggle was ahead with the Japanese because they will not give up until there is only a choice between death and capture, and they prefer death. The goal of the Americans is to fight the war and get home. For the Japanese, the goal is to fight and die—there can be no higher honor for a Japanese (to the Japanese) than to die on the battlefield, the speaker said. Because of this fanatical practice, it is imperative that Americans get on to the Japanese mainland and clean them out, he added. He said Americans would not have much trouble with the civilians because they are not so anxious to die.

## Exhibit Of Books And Art Of India At U. O.

An exhibit of books and art objects, illustrating life in India is currently featured at the university library. The exhibit is one of a series depicting countries bordering on the Pacific basin area.

The art objects shown with the display were loaned by Mrs. W. R. Cuthbert, who lived in India from 1926 until 1941, and who now makes her home in Eugene. The books with the exhibit are from the university library collection.

Articles of particular interest included in the display are a costume of a well-to-do woman, including an elaborately decorated skirt, bodice and sari, garment worn by women of India around their heads, and considered as distinctive of India as the kimono of Japan or the mantilla of Spain; a costume of a coolie woman; an intricately carved ivory necklace; beggar's bowl, used by beggars to collect money from people on the street; and ankle bracelet and rings of the type used by the women of India as their bank account. The women wear these pieces of jewelry until they have several and then exchange them at the bank for currency.

A domestic shrine of worship such as the natives have in their homes is also included in the collection.

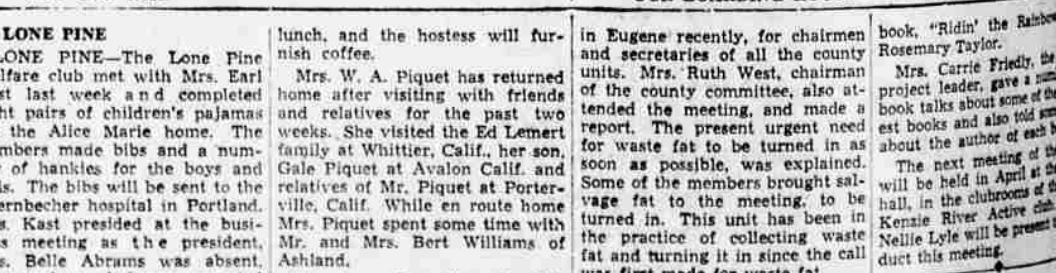
