James L. White, president of the Salt Lake City, Utah, United Jewish council for the past four years, will speak Monday evening to the local lodge of B'Nai B'rith.

FDR Defends Food Policy

WASHINGTON, March 16.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today vigorously defended the administration's policy of having this country help feed other less fortunate nations.

He told a news conference he was aware of some opposition to reducing American consumption of certain items so that people in other nations do not starve. But it is a matter of national decency that this nation help feed those who do not have enough to eat, he said.

No Suffering

Mr. Roosevelt said he could not bring himself to think that this country had suffered greatly or was going to when the American standard of living is compared with that of other countries.

He added that he thought his feelings reflected not only the attitude of the administration, but that of a large majority of the American population. Referring to the recent creation of a government committee which will examine and control the export of items other than actual military and lend-lease shipments, the president flatly rejected the assertion that this country would be starved to feed other nations.

few minutes during his train stop here.

That planning includes adequate buildings and facilities, sufficient staff of trained teachers, a sound curriculum, and a proper program, of letting the people and prospective students know what a university or college has to offer, he believes.

The 39-year-old new university executive, who comes from the State University of Iowa where he is dean of the college of liberal arts, has a friendly and warm personality; and from the first impression one sizes him up to be a person who stands on both feet to take over in the leadership assigned him.

Oregon Mist

He was most diplomatic about "Oregon's mist" (if you recall, the rain was coming down in buckets full Thursday evening) and casually asked his greeters when the storm started.

A slight cough or two came from the group about him, one finally piping up to say, "You see, Dr. Newburn, it hasn't stopped." The new president's answer was a broad grin and deep chuckle, with a deep comment, "Well, I saw a good snow storm in the mountains."

Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of the state system of higher education, met Dr. Newburn here and boarded the train to accompany him to Portland where they will confer with education and state leaders.

Enroute back to Eugene Saturday they will stop in Salem, Dr. Newburn to meet Gov. Earl Snell. Already Dated Up

Three informal dates already are on Dr. Newburn's calendar in Eugene for the first of the week. He will be a guest at Kiwanis meeting Monday noon (he is a Kiwanian in Iowa); he will be speaker for the Rotary luncheon Tuesday noon; and Wednesday afternoon he will talk at the meeting of the State Association of University of Oregon Women.

Dr. Newburn leaves to return to Iowa a week from Sunday, having come west this trip especially on business to work with education heads on university plans and budget problems.

Late in June he, Mrs. Newburn, and their three children, Jacqueline, 14, Robert, 12, and baby Michael, born last December, will come to Eugene. Dr. Newburn takes over his office July 1, succeeding the late Dr. Donald M. Erb as university president. Dr. Orlando John Hollis, dean of the campus law school, has been acting president and will serve in that capacity until July 1.

ever, bluntly called the resignation a "surprise" and published a New York dispatch quoting a "close friend of the duke" as saying Windsor thought he "could do a better job in Canada."

Other Factors

The diplomatic correspondent of the Daily Mirror said other factors also may have influenced the duke in his decision to resign. "For some time," he said, "there had been growing friction between the duke and a section of the European business community. Their approach to questions of native welfare and native representation in the government has been widely different."

"The duke has been anxious to bring into force certain reforms which he considered overdue but conflicted with his advisers thereon."

Nassau sources told the United Press correspondent there that the colony's good financial situation was due in large measure to Windsor's efforts to find employment for the inhabitants. He was responsible for sending 6,000 laborers to American farms, from which they have sent back more than \$1,000,000 in remittances and savings.
