Several years ago Dr. Rosalind Wulzen, then a member of the University of Oregon science faculty, began some apparently useless and completely academic experiments on flatworms (planarians). Last night, in Friendly hall, Dr. Wulzen, now associate professor of zoology in Oregon State college, told an audience, in an illustrated address, how this experimenting had finally worked out into the discovery of a new vitamin, not yet named, which eliminates stiffness due to accumulation of calcium in joints and muscles of animals.

On the program with Dr. Wulzen was Dr. W. J. Wagtenonk, research associate in Oregon State college, co-worker with her in the project. He told briefly how he had distilled an infinitesimal three milligrams of the new "oil" from 150 gallons of raw cream, and 10 milligrams of it from 10 tons of manure.

Through experiments on planarians and guinea pigs Dr. Wulzen found that a raw liver increased the growth rate of the animals, while a boiled liver diet greatly decreased the rate of growth as compared with the raw. A liver diet was found much better than one of pancreas, and the cortex of various animal organs were found much better food for growth than other parts of the same organs.

Sheep and cow livers were found superior to those of pigs, rats and cats. Liver from animals fed on kale—hardy curled-leaf cabbage—was found superior to spinach, lettuce, cucumbers, or any other of the regular crop of salad vegetables in arresting stiffness resulting from calcium accumulation.

Strangely enough, the speaker explained, cod liver oil was found

bad for creating stiffness in joints, while wheat germ oil was particularly good in clearing it up.

Commercial pasteurized cream was found of no value in retarding stiffness of joints.

Both Dr. Wulzen and Dr. van Wagtenonk emphasized that the experiments had been on animals and that they had no recommendations to make with regard to the use of molasses or other sources of the new vitamin. "They won't do you any harm," Dr. Wulzen smiled in answer to a query, while making it clear that anyone regulating his diet in accordance with what had been found effective in planarians and guinea pigs would be doing so on his own responsibility. The adaptation to human beings has not yet been made.

Dr. Wulzen was a member of the University of Oregon faculty from 1929 to 1934 and was recognized by that institution at the 1944 commencement with the honorary degree of doctor of science for her discovery in this field of nutrition.

The lecture Thursday night was one of the regular university lecture series arranged by a faculty committee headed by Dr. Rudolf H. Ernst, professor of English.

Thomas Cook, 84, a native of Lane county, died at Medford Feb. 28. He had long been a resident of Gold Hill. He was born near Junction City Nov. 2, 1869, and went to Jackson county with his parents when a child. They settled in the Applegate valley and later moved to the Foots creek district, then to Gold Hill.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Jane Cook, at Gold Hill; two daughters, Mrs. R. McGarvie of Oceanside, Calif., and Mrs. W. D. Curl of Jacksonville, and a son, Jake, at home.

Mrs. Cook is a sister of Charles Taylor of Noti and off Mrs. Mary Hale, also of that community, who died a year ago.

Thomas Cook was a prominent member of the Odd Fellows lodge at Gold Hill, having belonged for 46 years.

Eli G. Green, 79, died at a local hospital Thursday. He was born Sept. 8, 1865 at Osage, Iowa. He had been a resident of Eugene since 1942, moving here from South Dakota. In 1897, he married Julia Langdon at Sioux City, Iowa and they moved to South Dakota in 1922.

Funeral services will be held from the Poole-Larsen mortuary Monday, March 19, at 2 p.m. Interment will be in the Gillespie cemetery.

Premier Asks Finns To Work With Russia HELSINKI, March 18.—(AP)—The Finnish people, who vote tomorrow in their first national election since 1939, were exhorted by Premier Juho K. Paasikivi last night to rid parliament of its war-responsible elements and support a "new national policy in line with principles set forth in the Crimea conference."

The premier said "our foreign policy never in the future must be directed against the Soviet union."

He declared that "we have obtained freedom and independence

with our great neighbor's consent and we must conduct ourselves so that band of friendship and confidence between free Finland and the Soviet union is continually strengthened."
