Fisticuffs Fined; Good Friend Pays

Matt Solopak proved his friendship for Ben Kendall Wednesday. Matt had put up the \$25 which bailed Kendall out that morning after his arrest Tuesday night on a charge of drunkenness and fighting. When the case came to Municipal Judge Stanley R. Darling's court Wednesday afternoon, he imposed a \$50 fine on Kendall, 36, who had been in a fracas on

Seventh avenue Tuesday night with Guy Robertson, 46.

Both men appeared in court considerably battered. Matt Solopak did not object when the court declared the \$25 bail he had put up would be forfeited to apply on the fine. And Matt Solopak came forward to put up \$25 more to wipe out the fine imposed on his friend Kendall.

Pointing out that the evidence indicated Kendall had been the aggressor, Judge Darling fined Robertson \$25. He had been out on \$25 bail since Tuesday night. "You've got a good friend here

in Mr. Solopak," Judge Darling said to Kendall. "You shouldn't put him on the spot again."

No, Never Again. "That's right, Judge," Kendall replied. "And I'm not going to drink any more, the way I feel now."

Kendall denied he had picked the fight. Robertson said he couldn't remember for sure who was the aggressor. He said he had been invited to go outside a cafe to settle an argument and didn't recall many details. Kendall had

a black eye and had lost a tooth. Robertson's face was bruised, too. Kendall and his friends, Matt Solopak and Fred Schrum, went outside, and shortly afterward Robertson followed. Judge Darling wound up the day's business and declared court adjourned.

In previous hearings he imposed a \$10 fine on Merrill N. Manley for speeding and a \$5 fine on Anne Louise Starmer, on the same charge.

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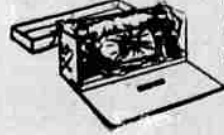
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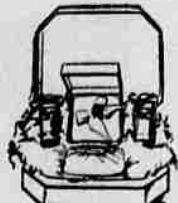
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
