

Nelson Captures Golf Tourney

GREENSBORO, N. C., March 26.—Byron Nelson, still turning in scores that look as if they might have been made on "Tom Thumb" golf course, added first money in the Greensboro Open Monday to his list of victories in the current campaign.

This time he won with strokes to spare, tying the Starmount course record with a 66 in his final round yesterday to take a 72-hole total of 271, eight ahead of his nearest competitor. It was his sixth triumph this season and his second in less than a week. He received a \$1,333.33 war bond purse.

Second place went to Sammy Byrd of Detroit with a 279. He finished with a 69 yesterday to nose out veteran Johnny Revolta of Evanston, Ill., for the runner-up purse of \$933.33. Revolta had a 71 on his final round to take a 280 total, winning \$733.33.

Nelson's victory yesterday provided him with an answer for the critics who said that he couldn't maintain his low-scoring pace except on the easier southern courses, some of which permitted winter rules and on the par five 14th made the Starmount course one of the most difficult the golfers have encountered. With his final 66 Nelson tied the course record set in 1938 by Sammy Snead. If he hadn't had hard luck with his putting he might have broken the record by three or four strokes.

A crowd of 10,000, largest of the southern tournament season, and a record for the course here followed the players.

Nelson got in front early and stayed there. He had birdies on four holes and on the par five 14th made his second eagle of the meet, dropping a 10-foot putt.

Snead Off Form
The Toledo veteran took over the lead after the first day of the meet leaving front-running Revolta comfortably behind him. Fourth money went to Jimmy Hines of Chicago with a 285 total. Craig Wood of Mamaroneck, N. Y., had a 286, and Snead, who was not up to his recent sharp form, finished in sixth with 287.

Ed Furgol, Detroit amateur, had a 288, while Jimmy Gaunt, of Ardmore, Okla., and Joe Zardhat of Norristown, Pa., had 290's. Avery Beck of Raleigh, N. C., an amateur was next with 291. Harold McSpaden of Sanford, Me., a 293, Tony Penna of Dayton, O., 295, Leonard Dodson of San Francisco, 298, Joe Taylor of Johnson City, Tenn., 298, and Willie Goggin of White Plains, N. Y., 300.

Haegg said that he hoped to be in peak condition for the Buffalo performance and expected to lower his Cleveland time considerably. He plans to leave for Sweden as soon as possible after the meet.

CORVALLIS, Ore., March 26.—(U.P.)—Oregon State college will not field a baseball team during the 1945 season. The intercollegiate athletic board announced Friday.

A conference vote eliminated the regular conference schedule for baseball and track, leaving any activity in those sports to the individual institutions on a local basis.

The absence of local institutional teams to form an adequate schedule was the deciding factor in the decision of the college athletic board. The board members are of the opinion that the decision not to resume baseball for the season is in line with wartime requests for curtailment of all possible travel.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 26.—(U.P.)—Air bases and other installations of the fourth air force in five Pacific coast states will engage in a five-sport competitive program this spring and summer, Major Edward B. Degroot, physical training officer, said Saturday.

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Tiger Pitcher Says He Won't Win Many

EVANSVILLE, Ind., March 26.—(U.P.)—Blond, slender Harold Newhouser, ace Detroit left-hander and the winningest pitcher of the major leagues in 1944, believes he won't duplicate his 29 victories this season—because he "can't get enough work to win like that."

"With our improved and strengthened pitching staff I'll be lucky to pitch enough games to win 20. I'll never win 29 again, probably not even 25—because I won't have to," the 25-year-old junior American League product declared here at spring training camp.

Newhouser, who ever before in a major league season won as many games as he lost, piled up a non-loss record of 29-9 in '44. But, like his wife, he is determined to win more than 30 innings of 47 games to do it, working out of turn both as a starter and in relief.

"I'm glad to have that year behind me," Newhouser said. "This year we've got pitchers—maybe five starters. If I keep in turn I'll probably work an average of 5½ times a month—that's 30 games. If I win two for every one I lose—and I should—that would be an even 20. So there you are. How could I?"

Mikan's Injury May Decide Hoop Title

NEW YORK, March 26.—(U.P.)—DePaul's basketball team which has gotten by nicely by "letting George do it," may have to adopt another slogan tonight when they play Bowling Green of Ohio for the national invitational title.

In almost every instance this season, the brilliance of All-American George Mikan has provided the Chicago Blue Demons with victory, but today the six-foot, nine-inch center still was limping from a saucer-sized bruise on his left leg. The injury, which occurred in practice, is healing and Coach Ray Meyer said that he definitely would start the big fellow. However, it remained to be seen whether he can operate at full efficiency.

Without Mikan the Blue Demons would be no better than an even choice to defeat the Ohio quintet. If he is on hand to go the full distance, DePaul is figured a 9 to 11 point favorite.

The game is expected to provide one of the year's keenest duels between tall centers. Dan Otten of the Ohioans, considered only a little less brilliant than Mikan.
