Duo-Piano Recital Called Brilliant

A small but highly receptive audience gathered Tuesday to hear the brilliant recital of Pierre Luboshutz and Genia Nemenoff, duo pianists, presented by the Civic Music Association at MacArthur court.

It takes cooperation to make a success of any team or group in any field, but Luboshutz and Nemenoff, in music, had more than just that. They gave a performance of teamwork exemplified through precise timing and exactness of technique plus creative imagination, tonal harmony, and complete "living" of composition. The performance of these artists was of charm and grace throughout.

From the opening number the extent of this "playing as one" was shown more and more through the Vivaldi "Concerto in A minor" and the closing number of Stravinsky, the "Russian Dance."

The recital as a whole was an inviting one of delightful recital literature; many arrangements for duo-pianos done by Pierre Luboshutz. Such of these were the closing group of numbers including the more modern compositions of Moussorgsky's "Coronation Scene" and the gay intriguing "Polka from Shostakovich's 'The Golden Age.' Also the dainty expressive tones of "The Lark" by Gluck and the "Russian Dance."

Delighting the audience with informality and generosity in the playing of encores the artists played the "Largo Al Factotum" from "The Barber of Seville," capturing on the instruments the exact quality and expression of life of a singer, the "Valse Tzigane" of Liszt and "Rhum-ba" by Milhaud.

This concert was number six in a series of eight, the series to be completed with performances in April and May.

IWA Renews Pacts In Plywood Plants

Renewal of a district-wide five-year contract with 11 plywood operations affiliated with IWA-CIO district 9 was announced in Eugene Wednesday by Henry Peck, business agent for local union 9-244.

Included among those to renew the working agreement are the Eugene Plywood company and the Springfield Plywood company, although the contract of the Springfield plant is subject to NLRB jurisdiction because of the AFL's petition for bargaining rights with the company.

"During the lifetime of the five-year agreement, there have been no work stoppages or strikes in these plywood plants," said Peck. "The district feels this is a good record which has been made possible only through the joint standing committees of the operators and the local union affected by this contract," he said.

Soldier Who Captures Adolf Gets Free Hand

LONDON, March 28.—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told Commons today that Adolf Hitler is the major war criminal and that British soldiers could decide for themselves whether to shoot him on sight or bring him back alive.

Eden said that Hitler, as the major war criminal under the Moscow declaration, would be punished by joint action of the allies if captured.

Eden was asked by Ivor Thomas, labor member, whether it would be the "duty of the British soldier who seeks Hitler out to shoot him or try to bring him back alive."

Author Demands Talk On Palestine

LOS ANGELES, March 28.—Author William B. Ziff attacked the British colonial office for its conduct of the mandate over Palestine and demanded last night that the Palestine problem be considered by the united nations conference at San Francisco.

In an address before a meeting of the Los Angeles Palestine committee of the Christian Council on Palestine, Ziff said a recent statement by British Prime Minister Winston Churchill indicated the Palestine question will be ignored at San Francisco.

Eleanor R. Tells Personal Sorrow In Minority Group

NEW YORK, March 28.—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt said last night that she first learned the unhappiness of minority groups when she was less than six years old, and she was that minority.

"I remember . . . being put for a very short time in a convent in France and there were only two other little girls anywhere near my age, and they had a little church," Mrs. Roosevelt said in a speech before the National Council of Jewish Women. "It was fascinating to a child to see all the little figures and animals and a baby, particularly the baby, and I longed to be allowed to play with it, but the other two little girls said, 'Oh no, you can't play with it. You don't belong. You are not of our religion or of our race.'"

Twelve students from Condon school will sing—Miriam Morgan, Bebe Clark, Synove Erickson, Earl Ellis, Christine Siefke, Elena Horn, Earla Ann Starkweather, Baily Morgan, LeRoy Hershiser, Sally Plummer, Peter Horn and Doris Morgan.

Miss Garnett will be narrator.

Shipyards To Obey Fair Practice Order

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Four of five west coast shipbuilding companies which have been involved in lengthy negotiations with the committee on fair employment practice have notified it of their compliance with an order against discrimination in employment.

The principal complaint alleged that qualified Negro workers were discriminated against by a closed shop contract, and by refusal of the International Brotherhood of Boilers, Ship Builders and Helpers (AFL) to admit Negroes to full membership.

The yards included the Oregon Shipbuilding corporation and the Kaiser company, Inc., both of Portland.
