Col. Zimmerman In Portland Army Post

New district engineer for the U. S. army engineers at Portland is Col. George J. Zimmerman, recently returned from war service in the Pacific.

Col. Zimmerman, who was in charge of the Portland district, which jurisdiction includes Eugene and the Willamette valley.

Col. Zimmerman will resign his army commission to enter private business, it is announced, and will be engaged in South America, it is understood.

Colonel Zimmerman served on the staff of Lt. Gen. R. C. Richardson, Jr., in Honolulu. He wears the bronze star, the American theater ribbon, Asiatic theater ribbon with two stars, and the Philippine liberation ribbon with two stars. He was recalled to the states in December to take the new assignment.

Colonel Zimmerman was born September 18, 1903 in Cincinnati, Ohio. He graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1926 and was appointed a second lieutenant in the army engineers in that year. He first served in the army at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

In 1931 he went to Hawaii with the army engineers and received his promotion to first lieutenant while there. In 1934 he returned to the United States and was assigned as assistant professor of military science and tactics at Washington State college in Pullman.

In 1936 he was on detached duty and served as assistant district engineer at Seattle, and in that year he was promoted to the grade of captain.

Re-Enlistment For Officers Outlined

Officers interested in a regular army career should submit applications without delay, it has been announced at ninth service command headquarters, Fort Douglas, Utah.

A bill recently signed by the president authorizes an increase in the commissioned strength of the army to 25,000, providing an opportunity for nearly 10,000 additional men who have served as temporary commissioned officers in world war II.

The legislation provides that qualified officers will be selected for service with the branch of their choice, in grades of second lieutenant to major, inclusive. The grade will be determined by the amount of constructive or actual commissioned service, whichever is greater.

Constructive service credit will be given for the number of years by which the applicant's age exceeds 25 years. Commissioned service will include all active duty commissioned service since Dec. 7, 1941, after the officer reached the age of 21. Service credit for officers now in reserve status will be computed as though they had remained on active duty until the time of appointment.

Applications by March

Applications must be submitted to reach the adjutant general's office, Washington, D. C., by March 1. Applicants on active duty will submit applications through their commanders, and those not on active duty, including those on terminal leave, will submit applications direct to the adjutant general. The proper form and information relative to submission of applications may be obtained at military installations and U. S. army recruiting stations. A new application is required regardless of prior submission of a declaration of interest.

Officers not on active duty will be notified when to appear at the nearest personal center for examinations.

With the exception of the adjutant general's department and judge advocate general's department, the following appointments in the various arms of services will be authorized: second lieutenant, less than 3 years service; first lieutenant, 3 or more, but less than 10 years; captain, 10 years or more, but less than 17; major, 17 or more, but less than 23 years service.

Applicants for judge advocate general's department who have less than 10 years service, but are between the ages of 30 and 35, will be considered for appointment in grade of captain. Adjutant general's department applicants between the ages of 28 and 34 may be commissioned more, but other branch and detailed in the adjutant general's department until eligible for transfer.

Commissions in the medical, dental, veterinary corps and corps of chaplains will start at first lieutenant for those having less than 3 years service. Those with 3 or more, but less than 12, will be captains, and those with 12 or more, but less than 20 years service, will be majors. Pharmacy corps officers (medical administrative and sanitary corps officers who so desire may also be commissioned in that branch) will receive second lieutenant commissions for less than 3 years service; first lieutenant for 3 or more, but less than 6 years; captain for 6 or more, but less than 12, and major for 12 or more, but less than 20 years.

Rank Status

New officers will rank immediately below officers in the same grade who are already in the regular army with an equivalent or next greater length of service. In cases of ties the position on the promotion list will be decided on the basis of commissioned service time and age. No appointee will be commissioned in a grade higher than the highest temporary grade held.

However, officers will retain present temporary rank if it is higher than the permanent rank until adjustments are made in war-time grades and all officers revert to permanent rank.

Technical specialists of whom special qualifications are required include: chaplains, chemical warfare service, corps of engineers, finance department, judge advocate general's department, ordnance department, corps of military police, quartermaster corps, signal corps, transportation corps, medical department, army air corps, and certain ground forces specialists.

United Air Lines Expands Personnel

With its new job placement bureau interviewing approximately 9,000 applicants a month, United Air Lines announced today it would employ an average of 450 persons a month for the next four years in its expansion program. More than 60 per cent of new personnel will be world war two veterans, according to R. F. Ahrens, vice president-personnel.

Ahrens said approximately 450 of the 1,400 men and women of United who went on military leave have returned and more are coming back daily. In line with the expected growth of the nation's domestic air transport system, the airline official said United plans to increase its personnel from a high of 3,500 before the war and approximately 8,000 today to a total of about 18,000 within four years.

In recognition of its program for employment and re-employment of war veterans, United recently was awarded the veterans' American Veterans of world war one and two and the national association of personnel directors.

Vitamin D Patents Dedicated To Public

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Attorney General Tom C. Clark has announced that under a consent judgment vitamin D patents owned by the Wisconsin Alumni Research foundation have been dedicated to the public.

So-called the "sunshine vitamin," vitamin D prevents and cures rickets.

Clark said the judgment, terminating a civil anti-trust suit against the foundation and 17 other firms, was entered in the United States district court at Chicago.

The government filed suit Oct. 20, 1944, charging foundation and 17 "of its so-called licensees," a department of justice statement said, with unlawfully conspiring to restrain and monopolize trade and commerce in vitamin D and vitamin D products.

The department said the degree enjoins the foundation from instituting suits for infringement or to collect royalties based upon any of the patents dedicated to the public, and also enjoins the foundation from entering any future licensing of patents relating to vitamin D which provide for price-fixing or impose restrictions upon the manufacture, use or sale of vitamin D or vitamin D products.

Among the patents dedicated to the public, the statement said, are those obtained by Prof. Harry Steenbock of the University of Wisconsin.
