

PA Ceilings in New Model Cars Revealed

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Motorists will pay from \$41 to more than in 1942 for 32 new automobile models for which prices have been set by the Federal Motor Vehicle Administration.

The latest prices, issued yesterday, included the first specific prices on 28 new model Plymouths, Chryslers, Dodges and DeSotos. It also covered four General Motors models.

Prices are FOB Detroit, do not include federal excise taxes, transportation or handling charges. They also exclude optional equipment such as heat, radio and grill guards.

Improvements in prices are to compensate manufacturers for engineering improvements and increased production costs. Dealers will absorb

another 2.5 per cent to cover other production increases.

The absorption of increased production costs by the dealers is part of OPA's industry-wide plan to keep retail automobile prices as near 1942 levels as possible.

Plymouth received a one per cent increase over 1942 plus \$70 to \$171 for engineering improvements.

Specific Incr. uses

Dodge prices are 3.5 per cent higher plus \$59 to \$68 more for improvements; Chrysler one-half per cent higher plus \$90 to \$104 for improvements; and DeSoto 1.8 per cent higher plus \$59 to \$66 for improvements.

No specific prices yet have been set on General Motors cars. They accounted for about 47 per cent of the country's new car production in 1941. GM products include Chevrolet, Pontiac, Buick, Oldsmobile and Cadillac.

OPA said, however, that basic prices for these cars would be about 2.5 per cent below 1942 levels. Allowances for engineering improvements in some cases may boost prices somewhat above 1942.

The \$117 increase was on the four-door Plymouth deluxe sedan which will sell at Detroit for \$999 as compared with \$882 in 1942.

The Ford convertible coupe had the smallest price increase of only \$41. It will sell for \$1,124 FOB Detroit as compared with its 1942 price of \$1,083.

Plymouth also may charge \$1.90 for a front bumper guard, \$2.40 for a rear guard; \$4.90 for outer guards, \$12.35 for a clock and \$26.20 for a master heater with defroster.

Ford's extras range from \$5.75 for a super deluxe built-in clock to \$45 for a radio. Prices of extras were proportionately higher for the most expensive Chrysler, Dodge and DeSoto.

U. O. English Dept. Has Record Classes

University of Oregon enrollment figures of 3321 to date may only be the third largest in history for winter term, but departmental figures are enjoying their biggest boom ever, according to Randall Mills, instructor in English in charge of handling late English enrollees.

"This is the largest load we have ever had; all sections in composition have been reorganized with nine newly-created sections filled already," Mr. Mills stated.

The highest enrollment, numbering 3476, came in 1940-41, boom years due to the influx of students eager for college training before the selective service affected their education. At that time the peak of English composition registration was 944. To date, approximately 1450 students are enrolled in composition this term.

Also in winter term of 1940-41, 677 students were registered in the English survey classes. Divided over 13 sections, a total of 815 students are taking the course now.

"This is the biggest the school has ever been in the lower division; we're still not overloaded in the upper division groups," commented Dr. P. W. Souers, head of the English department.

Challenged With Super-Parsnip, Route F Undaunted

Lane county's most ambitious parsnip is believed to have been located in the vegetable garden of Mrs. Charles Anderson, who brought the huge specimen to the Register-Guard office. The parsnip, its single top as big around as a goose-sized salad plate, weighed six and one-half pounds, and has about 20 separate branching roots. Mrs. Anderson offers it in competition to Route F.

Route F counters with a snowball bush which bloomed Dec. 27, at Mapleton. W. H. Vimont, principal of the grade school there, sent a picture of the blossom to his mother, Mrs. Bertha Vimont, 248 Eleventh avenue east, and she brought it to the Register-Guard office to show the onion editor. Snowballs normally are in bloom for Decoration day, the end of May.

VFW Will Appeal Unemployment Rule

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—At least one veterans organization has promised an appeal to congress from a decision denying GI unemployment benefits to a veteran thrown out of work by the General Motors strike.

The ruling by Veterans Administrator Omar N. Bradley upheld the Michigan unemployment compensation commission.

Asserting that the decision may affect "hundreds of thousands" of ex-servicemen, Omar B. Ketchum, national legislative representative of the veterans of foreign wars, told a reporter:

"We will introduce an amendment to the GI bill as soon as possible so veterans who do not vote for strikes, but are thrown out of work when strikes occur, may collect awards."

Veterans, Ketchum added, "are being made the goat of the strike situation."

Navy Accepts Two Year Enlistments

"Laying the keel" for a new navy to safeguard our nation's frontiers and help enforce world peace, the navy recruiting service today is accepting applications for two-year enlistments, the shortest period of enlistment in more than two decades.

Announcement to that effect was made by T. A. McGinnis, recruiter in charge of the navy recruiting station in this area. The Lane county recruiting office is located in the postoffice building.

The two-year enlistment, it was explained, has a dual purpose. First, it gives a young man an opportunity for a "trial run" in the navy without the necessity of committing himself or his future. Second, by training men in the fundamentals of the many navy trades, the navy protects itself and the country against future eventualities.

In addition to the two-year enlistment, applications are being accepted from 17-year-olds for three-year and minority enlistments, the local recruiting officer said. A minority enlistment is until age 21.

Oregon Chickens Working Overtime

PORTLAND, Ore.—(U.P.)—Oregon chickens are working overtime.

The U. S. bureau of agricultural economics reports that egg production in Oregon during December, 1945, totaled 35,000,000, or 6 per cent more than the same month a year ago. An unusually high rate of lay was the main factor in the jump in production, since the number of layers was 3,152,000, nearly the same as a year earlier.

Total egg production for 1945 amounted to 480,000,000, 9 per cent above the 10-year average although 6 per cent under 1944.

Churchill Defends U. S. Loan To Britain

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 18. —(U.P.)—Winston Churchill, here on a victory vacation but his mind full of world affairs, today defended the proposed \$3,750,000,000 loan to Britain by declaring it was vital "to give us time to get on our feet again."

"We have suffered financially more than any other country," said the war leader who is now leader of his majesty's loyal opposition.

"Now we face the extraordinary situation of buying food and raw materials with a very heavy adverse balance of trade against us."

"I think his majesty's government would never desire to raise the social and economic standards of the British people at the expense of other people, but unless we are given a chance to regain our stride we may not again be able to take our place as a producing nation."
