

S. Oil Field In Hungary Said Seized By Soviets

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The New York Times said Monday in a dispatch from Budapest that the Red army had seized the Hungarian oil fields at Lisse, including the largest which is owned by the Standard Oil company of New Jersey.

The Russians put in their own geologists and barred Standard Oil's general manager from the field several days ago, the dispatch said. The oil from the field is being sent in Standard Oil's pipelines to the company's refineries where it is paid for by the Russians, however.

The dispatch said the Russians explained that American development technique was 25 years behind the times, compared with the practices in Russia where 100 per cent recovery of oil reserves is common.

Standard Oil experts were quoted as saying that by their methods 80 per cent of the oil in the Lisse field might be recovered with care, but that great waste would result from the Russian methods. The Russian action was interpreted as disclosing an intention to exploit the field to the utmost without regard to long-range usefulness of the field, in the expectation that eventually the Russians will be obliged to withdraw their forces from the country.

When the Red army originally occupied Hungary, the dispatch

said, the Russians took over the field and removed much of the equipment. Part of this was restored after a few months, however, and Standard Oil employees were permitted to retake possession and carry on operations.

The dispatch pointed out that American property was exempt from the Hungarian reparations agreement with Russia, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia, and the Potsdam declaration permitted Russia to take only German assets in Hungary.

Jobless Chinese Beat U. S. Sailors

SHANGHAI, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Several American sailors were beaten by demonstrating unemployed Chinese today during a parade in protest against the municipal government.

The sailors, in a navy truck loaded with supplies, were trying to get into a sidestreet from the Bund. Some 10,000 to 20,000 Chinese were marching five abreast with banners accusing Shanghai authorities of failure to solve unemployment problems.

Witnesses said the Chinese swarmed over the truck, beating several sailors and hurling pieces of broken bottles at others, but rejoining the parade after navy shore patrolmen drew pistols. None of the sailors were injured seriously.

The demonstrators' banners urged the municipal government to open war-closed factories and permit "freedom" in organization of labor unions.

Holdout Jap Leader Commits Suicide

MANILA, (AP)—One of the last holdout Japanese commanders in mountainous northern Luzon committed suicide Friday when American reconnaissance patrols contacted remnants of his regiment on the shores of Casiguran bay.

As the Yanks landed from a flying boat, Colonel Youssa shot himself. One company of Japanese surrendered. The balance of the regiment fled into the hills.

The Japanese, near starvation and suffering from disease, had besieged a village in the hope of getting food and salt.

It is estimated 5,000 to 10,000 Japanese still roam the jungles of north and central Luzon.

UNPAID BILLS
FRANKFURT.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler and Eva Braun still owe the city of Munich 1,000 marks in unpaid electric light bills, the American-sponsored Dana news agency reported today. The news agency cited a Munich city treasury report which said Hitler owed 600 marks and Eva Braun owed 400, but that the bills were uncollectable since both appear to have died in Berlin.

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Yamashita Suit Brings Kerr Home

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Maj. Robert M. Kerr, chief prosecutor in the war criminal trial of Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, was here today visiting his family while awaiting the supreme court decision on the Yamashita case.

Kerr said the decision on Yamashita's contention he should have been tried in civil court could establish, for the first time, the right to try war criminals before military tribunals.

Kerr, son of the former Oregon State college president, told interviewers the former Japanese commander in the Philippines "had a very thorough and fair trial. . . . We reached the conclusion that Yamashita was responsible for a deliberate campaign of extermination, terrorism and devastation."

Kerr, who practiced law here before joining the army in 1942, in as Oregon State and University of Michigan law school graduate. His wife and two sons live here.

there were security reasons why he could not be given this information, he should have directed specifically an all-out alert as he did on a false alarm in 1940.

3. The action in dispatching unarmored bombers from the mainland to Hawaii on the night of Dec. 6, 1941, "confirmed me in my belief that an air raid was not probable."

4. The navy did not ask for any army planes from Nov. 27 to Dec. 6 to aid in reconnaissance and "to me this meant that they had definite information of the location of Japanese carriers."

5. Had he been given by telephone General Marshall's Dec. 7 message which arrived too late, he would have had four hours to prepare for the attack.

6. The war department had nine days after the Nov. 27 warning message to change the anti-sabotage alert which he notified Washington he had put in effect.

7. He now realizes that "my decision was wrong" to alert only against sabotage, but thinks his judgment at the time that sabotage was the greatest danger and "that air attack was not imminent" was the same as the general staffs.

"I do not feel that I have been treated fairly or with justice by the war department," Short told the committee. "I was singled out as an example, as the scapegoat for the disaster. My relatively small part in the transaction was not explained to the American people until this joint congressional committee forced the revelation of facts."

opening of wage negotiations between the CIO United Steelworkers and major steel producers. Steel production dropped to less than five per cent of capacity, a 53-year low, as strikers took up picket lines in plants in 28 states. Only two instances of violence, both in Ohio, were reported.

CIO President Philip Murray in a radio speech last night, said the strike in support of wage increase demands was precipitated by "an evil conspiracy among American Big business" which has "set out to destroy labor unions, to provoke strikes and economic chaos and mulct the American people through uncontrolled profits and inflation."

Today in New York Benjamin F. Fairless, president of the United States Steel corporation, said today the industry met the united steel workers "more than half way" in wage negotiations and that responsibility for the strike "rests with the union."

"We did everything reasonably within our power to avert this disastrous steel strike," he told reporters at the company's office. "Our offer of a wage increase of 15 cents an hour met 75 per cent of the union's proposal."

Truman Names Air, Maritime Executives

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Richard Parkhurst of Massachusetts was nominated by President Truman today to membership on the United States maritime commission.

At the same time, Clarence M. Young of California was nominated to be a member of the civil aeronautics board.

Parkhurst was nominated for the unexpired term of six years, dating from April 16, 1942, of Vice Adm. Howard L. Vickery, who recently resigned.

Parkhurst is a republican and a member of the Boston port authority.

Young's nomination was for the term of Edward P. Warner, expiring Dec. 31, 1946.

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Nag From Jap Emperor's String Given Sulfa Drugs

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22.—(AP)—First Frost, white Arabian horse from the stables of Japanese Emperor Hirohito, was receiving sulfa drugs and a special strengthening diet today to overcome the effects of seasickness.

The horse, property of Lt. Joseph R. (Dick) Ryan, Ocean-side, Cal., arrived aboard the transport SS Golden Eagle, which contained a special stall for the horse.

"He got sick about two days out of Yokohama and didn't eat a bite for nearly two weeks," Ryan said.

The Japanese racing association awarded the horse to Ryan, who rode him in a rodeo in Tokyo. Ryan planned to take First Frost to his Ocean-side ranch for breeding and exhibition as soon as he is well enough to travel again.

Army veterinarian, Capt. Percy Aldrich, meanwhile was administering sulfa drugs to stave off possible pneumonia and coaxing First Frost to munch on hay to give him strength.

Ryan received army permission to bring his horse home after military authorities at first expressed reluctance to transport the horse.

Churchill Enjoying Vacation In U. S.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. — (AP) — "This vacation has all the earmarks of being a complete success," Winston Churchill said with satisfaction.

Britain's wartime leader so far has achieved the first aim of his vacation — to do nothing and to do it in privacy.

Except for the first couple of days when curiosity overcame breeding, and a few persons gathered on the sidewalks opposite the home of his host, Col. Frank W. Clarke, Churchill has been afforded complete privacy.

Twice he has bunched up his easel and steel and travelled to nearby San Marino island to paint. Several times he has relaxed in the sun at his host's cabana at the swank Surf club.

Churchill often has gone driving with Clarke along Miami Beach's hotel row, but nobody has paid any attention to him.

Recruiter Stresses Navy Retirement Pay

Investment of \$75,000 at a safe rate of interest would be required to equal the retirement pay of a navy man, according to Thomas A. McGinnis, recruiter in charge of the navy recruiting station in this area. The Lane county recruiting office is located in the basement of the postoffice building.

The average man is retired from the navy in his middle 30's with an income sufficient to take care of him for the rest of his life, the recruiting officer pointed out.

"There is nothing to prevent a retired navy man from getting a job in the trade which the navy has taught him and adding materially to his income," he added.

Taxpayers Will Get Aid On Returns

The deputy collector of internal revenue will be in Lane county from Feb. 1 to March 15 to assist taxpayers in preparing their federal income tax returns, according to an announcement by the Portland office of the treasury department.

The aid of the deputy collector will be available every week day except Saturdays and Feb. 22, of the six-week period, it was announced.

On Feb. 11 he will be in Cottage Grove; Feb. 18, Westfir; Feb. 19, Oakridge; Feb. 14, Junction City; and Feb. 20 and 21 he will be in Florence. The remainder of the time he will be in Eugene, it was announced.

A Nodding Acquaintance With The Stars Is Pleasant Gain

Should the curtain of cloud some evening roll itself up into nothingness and allow the infinitudes of the great spaces to reveal themselves to earth-dwellers, why not spend a few minutes under the open sky and try to name the brighter stars? This is very easily done, and often starts a most pleasurable study which endures throughout a lifetime.

Let us observe around 6 p.m. Somewhat north of east we find a splendid curve of four bright stars. Counting from the highest down, these are Castor, Pollux, Mars (the finest of all) and Saturn. The last two are planets. South of east, a striking group of stars outlines Orion, the Hunter, who at present is leaning far over backwards. Three equally bright stars in a short vertical line form the hunter's belt. Bright Betelgeuse to the left is in his shoulder or, and steelywhite Rigel to the right shines in his shoe buckle.

Dog-Star Appears
Within an hour or a little more, Sirius, the dog-star, the brightest of all fixed stars in the sky, will be glittering and flashing colors low in the southeast. Procyon in the Little Dog will appear almost due east even earlier.

Almost in line with Orion and the zenith—and high in the sky—orange Aldebaran shines among

the little stars of the V-shaped Hyades cluster. The V lies on its side with the point toward the south. Still higher, the tiny dipper of the Pleiades, made up of six little stars, usually attracts immediate attention.

In the Eastern Sky
Now look high in the eastern sky, a little north of due east, for the bright yellow Capella, the principal star in the Chariot.

Turning our gaze toward the southwest, we find near the horizon blue-white Fomalhaut in the Southern Fish. Fairly low in the west, Altair will soon be setting. In the northwest, brilliant Vega is scintillating as the principal ornament in the Harp of Orpheus; while considerably above and to the south, Deneb, less luminous but conspicuous, stands at the top of the large figure of the Northern Cross.

Be sure to look for our familiar Big Dipper. This evening it is right-side up and not high above the northern horizon. In our latitudes this group never sets, but during a day seems to make a complete circuit around the north star. By 6 a.m. it will be almost overhead and upside down.

In the Antarctic regions where Admiral Byrd has sometimes wintered the Big Dipper never appears above the horizon. An army veteran who has spent long, weary months in the southern seas, was recently describing the splendor of the Southern Cross, seen well only from that part of the world. "It's a fine group," he said, "but do you know I like our common old Big Dipper a lot better."
