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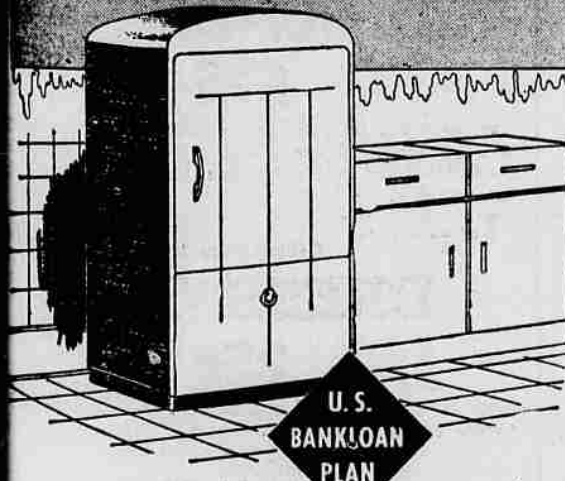

Portland.

Woodrow Wilson high school
will hear a trio composed of Miss
Misley, Miss Jacobs, and Johnson
on Thursday, Jan. 24, at 12:45 p. m.,
followed at 3:30 p. m. the same
day by the team of Miss Bozorth,
Miss Misley and Cramer.

Dole, Miss Jacobs, Knight,
Johnson, and Miss Bozorth will
debate the controversial subject
at the university-affiliated West-
minster House Sunday, Jan. 27,

Surplus Goods Forms
Here For Veterans

Veterans' application forms for
purchase of surplus government
property can be obtained at any
selective service board in Oregon,
it was announced Wednesday. Lane
county boards are located in the
Pioneer Building, (old post office
building). Clerks at the boards
will aid the veterans in filling out
the forms, authenticate discharge
papers, and mail the forms to the
Portland office of smaller war-
plants corporation, which acts on
the applications and determines
eligibility.

The veteran must state that he
needs the surplus equipment either
in his own business or profes-
sional or agricultural enterprise,
or that he needs it as a condition
of his employment. If he quali-
fies, he will be sent a pink slip
certifying that he has preference
over other persons in the pur-
chase of desired equipment.

Veterans are advised not to ap-
ply for cars, as none are avail-
able and more than 2000 persons
have applied already. Officials
have stated that about \$75,000
worth of equipment a week is go-
ing to Oregon veterans, consist-
ing largely of trucks, tractors,
bulldozers and other construction
items.
