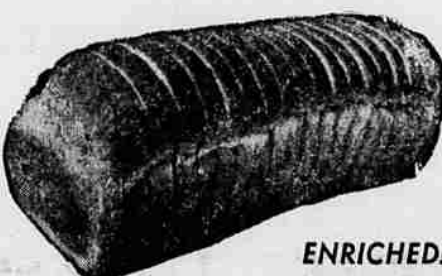


German Navy Equally Big 3
 LONDON Jan. 23.—(AP)—Remnants of the German fleet, once a factor in world affairs, are being divided among the victors. Three—Britain, Russia and the United States—of the surface units of the fleet, amounting to 1,759 vessels, together with 30 submarines, are being split up on a tripartite basis, a tripartite communiqué said last night.

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Lumber Group Talks Sustained Yield Plan
 The temporary executive committee of the Western Association of Lumbermen and Loggers met for a luncheon meeting Tuesday at the Osburn hotel to discuss plans for conducting their campaign against allotment of timber in the sustained yield program which has been proposed for logging operations on Oregon and California land grants.
 The temporary committee of the association charged that the "sustained yield" plan would result in a monopoly of the lumber industry in the state. The brief of the association was filed with regional office of the O & C administration in Portland by Frank B. Reid, for consideration before any permanent decision is made.
 Under the proposed plan only those now owning timber in Oregon would be eligible to buy government timber in the units. At a recent hearing here objections to this plan were raised. O and C and other officials said they would be glad to consider any better plan but that none had been presented.

 Dr. Harry K. Newburn, University of Oregon president, addressed the Tuesday night banquet.
 Mayor McNutt reported seeing Mr. and Mrs. John Quiner at the convention. Quiner, formerly with the city engineer's office here, is now assistant city engineer at The Dalles.

AFL's Green Says That Truman Is Acting On Wrong Information
 MIAMI, Fla.—(AP)—President William Green of the American Federation of Labor said he thought President Truman is "sincere in what he is trying to do, but like many sincere men, he has the wrong information and advice."
 At a press conference following the first meeting of the AFL executive council here, Green said there was no necessity for any anti-labor legislation. He contended that "genuine collective bargaining and arbitration" could solve any problem between labor and management.
 He made his remark about Mr. Truman when asked his opinion about the president's support of some labor bills pending in congress and his fact-finding boards to deal with strikes in general.
 "What we want is to get away from government control back to the original basis upon which our national economy rests," Green said.
 Green said he had written a personal letter to all members of congress recently voicing the AFL's opposition to "some 160 bills aimed at impairing or restricting the freedom of the nation's workers and the unions which represent them."
 A statement issued by the council said that "congress needs a cooling-off period right now much more urgently than labor."
 The statement said that anti-labor legislation "is also anti-American legislation" and that it would "punish most severely the workers and trade unions that have bargained peacefully with employers and refrained from strikes."

Highway Office Gets New Superintendent

A. J. Ford, formerly of Portland, has been named maintenance superintendent of the Eugene state highway department office, according to report from K. D. Lytle, division engineer, Roseburg, Wednesday.
 Ford succeeds Joseph G. Toole, maintenance superintendent here for the past eight years. Toole has been transferred to Klamath county, where he will be in charge of a large highway construction project, Lytle said.
 Ford previously had charge of a highway maintenance district.
 Mrs. Virginia Shultz has resigned as chief clerk in the district maintenance office, and will be succeeded by Charles Thornton.

 To open the program, the Eagles will aid children not cared for in the welfare department who may need health or social adjustments. Judge G. F. Skipworth, head of the circuit court and juvenile department, and Earl A. Britton, chief probation officer of the juvenile department of the circuit court, will recommend cases to the committee.
 Leonard Wildish has been announced as committee chairman, with Frank E. Selig, C. A. Swartz, Hugh Proudfoot, William Kelsey, Dr. G. H. Crusen and Harvey Statzer as members.
 At a meeting Tuesday night the Eagles lodge voted full authority to the committee to act on the recommendation of the juvenile department. Dental work, eye care and other problems will be financed by the lodge. This is the beginning of a program which the Eagles intend to broaden in time.

 Also Thursday according to United Press report, will be a meeting of the two-state west coast bureau of lumber grades and inspections.

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
