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expense account, and fixing the term of his appointment at five years with the possibility of reappointment for a second five-year term.

Byrnes said he did not know whether Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower would reconsider his refusal to accept the secretary-generalship since the question had not been raised recently.

He said Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., American member of the security council, would head the American delegation after his departure, and that Senator Tom Connally would be the American member of the important general committee of the assembly.

In a speech to the assembly urging creation of the atomic commission Byrnes said it was necessary to save the world from an atomic armaments race.

The action came after little more than an hour of discussion during which both Byrnes and Chief Soviet delegate, Andrei Vishinsky, urged prompt action.

The vote was 47 to 0, with four nations abstaining. Almost simultaneously the world security council announced that it would meet tomorrow to consider the complaints involving Iran, Greece and Indonesia.

The complaints provide the basis for the first major tests of the UNO's machinery to settle disputes.

The atomic commission would have no power to compel the United States or any other country to disclose any of its atomic energy production secrets or disclose how the atomic bomb is made, according to interpretations given by Byrnes. Its responsibility will be to work out ways of keeping atomic energy from being used destructively.

It will be composed of representatives of the 11 nations on the security council and Canada, and will be responsible to the council for its work and policies.

Three-Car Collision Injures Driver

A police report stated that the vehicle driven by Hypes struck a car driven by Eugene Kenneth Jackson, Lexington, and turned almost around, forcing Jackson's car into a head-on collision with a third car, driven by Harry R. Havercroft, 325 Blair street, Eugene.

The front end of Havercroft's car was all but demolished, and considerable damage was done to the other two.

4. Workers in two electrical plants threatened to strike Monday—forcing mines in Kentucky and Virginia to close and throw 150,000 miners out of work—if a new contract has not been signed by then.

Predict Meat Unions' Return

High administration leaders in Washington were confident that striking packinghouse workers would return to work under government operation of the meat plants despite opposition to seizure.

The seizure order, it was learned, will authorize the agriculture department to accept the wage recommendations of the government fact-finding panel now hearing testimony in Chicago in the meat dispute.

Benjamin F. Fairless, president of the U. S. Steel corporation, suggested in a radio address last night that "experienced executives" of industry be consulted to open the way to solution of the steel and other strikes.

Measville, CIO President Philip Murray and his steelworkers' wage policy committee called on President Truman to turn over government-owned steel facilities to men like Henry J. Kaiser.

Kaiser signed a contract with the union granting an 18 1/2-cent hourly wage increase to workers in his Fontana, Cal., plant. The compromise figure, suggested by Mr. Truman, had been accepted for workers in the entire industry by Murray but rejected by U. S. Steel and other big companies.

In his radio talk, Fairless said the difference between the company offer and the union's demand amounted to only \$1.50 a week per worker, whereas it would increase costs to the industry by approximately \$135,000,000 a year.

Train Strike Averted Less than half an hour before a strike deadline last night, representatives of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Indiana Harbor and Belt and Chicago Junction railroads announced a compromise settlement of accumulated grievances.

Work stoppages on the two lines would have tied up freight traffic into and through Chicago. Together, the two roads handle thousands of freight cars daily from 21 major railroads.

But the threat of a nationwide railroad strike within a month remained.

BRT President A. F. Whitney confirmed in Cleveland yesterday that he had called for a strike vote among the union's 300,000 members in a showdown over long-smouldering grievances with the big railroads.

In addition, 15 unidentified U. S. transports, landing craft and auxiliary vessels will be test targets.

Foreign ships to be included in the first test are the German heavy cruiser Prinz Eugen, which arrived at Boston only yesterday, the Japanese battleship Nagato and the Japanese light cruiser Sakawa.

Three Tests Differ

The atomic bomb in the May test will be dropped by an army air forces bomber and will be timed to explode several hundred feet above the target ships, Blandy said.

In the second test set for July 1, which also probably will be held at Bikini, the bomb will burst at the water's surface.

The third test calls for a deep underwater atomic explosion on the open seas. Blandy said technical difficulties involved in this test "will not permit its accomplishment in 1946."

The prime mission of the tests, Blandy told the committee, is to determine the bomb's effect on naval vessels "in order to gain information of value to the nation defense." Ultimate results of the experiment from the navy standpoint, he added, will be translated into terms of future U. S. sea-power.

Secondary purposes of the tests will be to give the army air forces training in attacking naval vessels with the atomic bomb. Damage wrought by the explosions on military installations and equipment also will be determined.

Total personnel involved in the operation will be about 20,000 men.

Cities' League Elects McArthur Treasurer

J. W. McArthur, superintendent of the Eugene water board, was elected treasurer of the League of Oregon Cities at the final session of its convention in Portland Wednesday, according to the United Press.

Herbert Kehrli, Eugene, was named secretary of the Oregon Finance Officers' association.

The convention has been a joint meeting of the league and the association. At the final session, a resolution was passed calling for a greater decentralization of distribution centers for surplus materials, downward revision of minimum purchase lots and permission of resale of excess amounts with proper safeguards.

J. V. Rogers, Wenatchee, president of the Association of Washington Cities, advised Oregon counties to employ full-time purchasing agents to take fullest advantage of government surplus properties.

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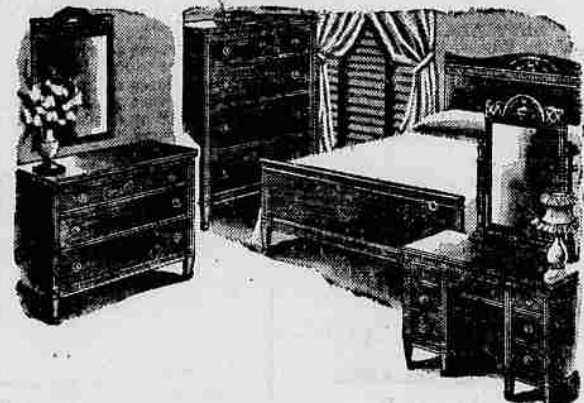

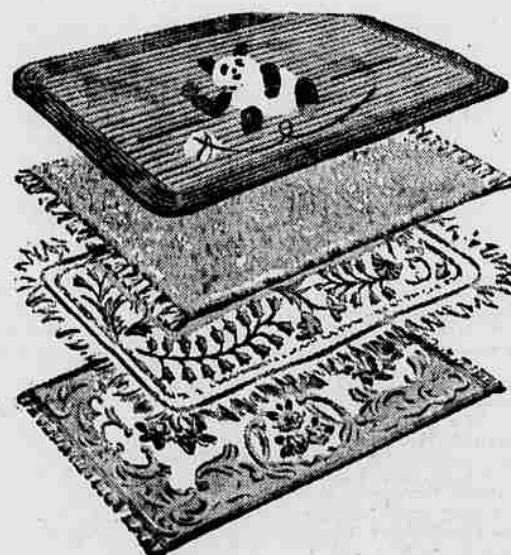

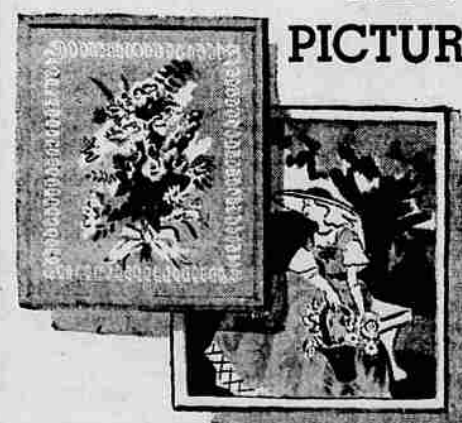
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
