Jap Press Tries Devious Ways To Get Around U. S. Censors

 SAN FRANCISCO (U.P.)—A speckled hen in Hiroshima has laid an egg. It was her first since the advent of the atomic age last August.

This is according to the Tokyo Asahi Shimbun. It might mean that the Japanese are thinking better of such widely-spread yarns as the one about Hiroshima never being habitable again because of lingering radioactivity—yarns designed to strengthen the Japanese reaction that the atomic bomb was a crime against humanity.

But it could be that Asahi doesn't want its readers to forget Hiroshima, which it's doubtful they ever could anyway.

B-29 Makes Flight At 40,000 Feet

DAYTON, O.—(U.P.)—A specially-equipped B-29 Superfortress flew three hours and 38 minutes at an altitude over 40,000 feet where 86 degrees below zero was recorded, the air technical service command has reported.

The flight, which the ATSC believed was an endurance record for stratosphere flight by heavier-than-aircraft, was made at Boeing Aircraft company, Seattle, Wash., to test various types of equipment for stratosphere bombers.

The B-29 high altitude laboratory, officials predicted, might break the high altitude record of 43,500 feet, set last year by a B-17 bomber.

Crew members of the B-17 used only oxygen masks to combat effects of low pressure and were forced to rest for two or three days after flying two hours at that altitude.

Cars Selling Like Hotcakes Sight Unseen

NEW YORK (U.P.)—If you think you would like to order a new automobile, the line forms on the right.

That's the way it is at the Waldorf-Astoria where the first 1947 models of the new Kaiser and the Frazer cars are on display.

Buyers are placing orders so fast that salesmen are getting writer's cramp filling them out.

It's like a postwar sale of girdles with buyers asking fewer questions. Those who do want to know more about the car are discouraged from asking questions by buyers in the line behind them.

During a two-hour period 467 bona fide orders were taken. One thousand orders were placed for the cars the first day they were on display.

At first deliveries were promised for the Frazer in April or May and the Kaiser in May or June. But as the orders piled up, this was extended later into the year.

State Liquor Supply Said Dwindling Away

PORTLAND (U.P.)—Ray Conway, state liquor administrator, reports that Oregon will have the worst liquor shortage this year since the state control system began.

National supplies of scotch, bonded and straight whiskies are steadily thinning, Conway says, and will not improve, in some types, for three years.

In a speech before the League of Oregon Cities and Oregon Finance Officers conventions, he predicted bootlegging problems and asked for public opinion on the whiskey shortage.

A. T. Niebergall, Bend mayor, reported crowds of 1000 about Bend's liquor store at whiskey sale time, and said he personally would recommend a return to rationing.

Citizens Education Council Plans Survey

PORTLAND (U.P.)—The new United Citizens Higher Education Council of Oregon, an outgrowth of the building fund campaign last June, announced its purpose Tuesday as informing Oregonians of higher educational needs and the state's possibilities.

The executive committee of the council, led by Vice-Chairman Claude Palmer, Portland photographer, and Ernest Haycox, Portland author, told the state board of higher education they will not be a pressure group.

Palmer outlined these objectives: study of the schools' building needs; better equipment; higher staff salaries to get and hold good faculties; encouragement of research, partly through federal aid; expansion of adult education; assistance with the housing emergency and attention to building up endowments and grants for the institutions.

Haycox stressed a plan for co-operation rather than pressure, with attention both to taxpaying ability and service sought by the people of Oregon.

Oregon can afford the kind of education it wants, Haycox declared, as the per capita income here is much higher than the national average.

Local Woman Earns Degree In Nursing

Jewel Neunfeldt of Eugene has qualified for a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing at the department of nursing of the University of Oregon medical school, Portland, according to an announcement released by Henrietta Doltz, director.

Miss Neunfeldt's B. S. degree will qualify her for specialized opportunities in advanced nursing work. She took two years of pre-nursing college work at Oregon State college.

She will receive her Bachelor of Science diploma at graduation exercises in June.

Civilian Platoon To Again Aid Farmers

CORVALLIS (U.P.)—Mixed platoons of city women and children will be used again this year in the 1946 farm labor program in Oregon, the Oregon State college extension service has reported.

Groups of around 35 or 40 women were organized last year and then joined with children. About 9,000 women, most of whom were city housewives, were placed by 28 county farm labor offices in 27,086 different jobs in 1945.
