Mayor Earl McNutt Friday designated Saturday, Jan. 26, as Donald Anderson day in honor of the Prineville boy whose pictures appear on March of Dimes campaign material. Donald was a victim of infantile paralysis and was assisted in his recovery by money contributed to the March of Dimes.

In making his proclamation, Mayor McNutt urged all citizens of Eugene to contribute to the utmost of their capacity.

Donald Anderson day in Eugene will see the junior chamber of commerce's "Battle of Williamette street" beginning about noon at the corner of Broadway and Williamette street. Karl Jasper, chairman of the event, said Friday that the Jaycees would provide music and that the event will last until late afternoon. Tables placed on opposite sides of the street will be marked off in squares so that dimes contributed by east and west side Eugeneans can easily be counted. Representing their respective sides of town will be Loy Rowling, vice-president of the First National bank (west), and Alex Atterbury, proprietor of the Pennywise Drug store (east). The object is to see which side of town can contribute the larger amount in dimes for the infantile paralysis campaign.

BARBECUED SPARERIBS

3 to 4 lbs. pork spareribs or lean beef shortribs
3 cans Del Monte Tomato Sauce
1 cup vinegar
3 tps. sugar
1 medium sized onion, minced

1 clove garlic, minced
2 or 3 small, pickled red chili peppers, minced
Salt and pepper to taste
1 tbs. Worcestershire Sauce
1 cup hot water

Arrange the meat in a good-sized baking pan. Combine remaining ingredients in a saucepan and simmer until slightly thickened, about 15 minutes. Pour over the meat and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) until the meat is tender, about 3 hours. Do not cover. Add a little water if needed but the richness of the sauce should not be too greatly thinned. Extra good served with hot buttered hominy and a green salad. Serves 5 to 7.

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
