The annual business meeting of the church will be held at the church Wednesday, Jan. 30 at 7:30 p.m. All church members are asked to be present.

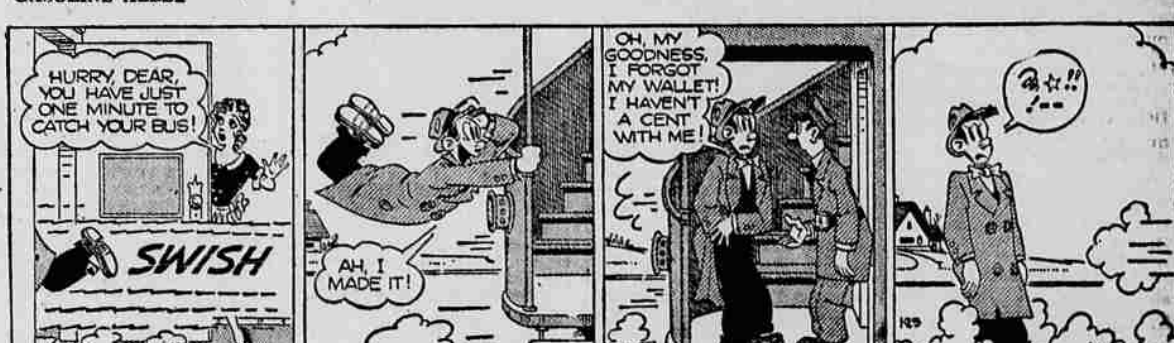

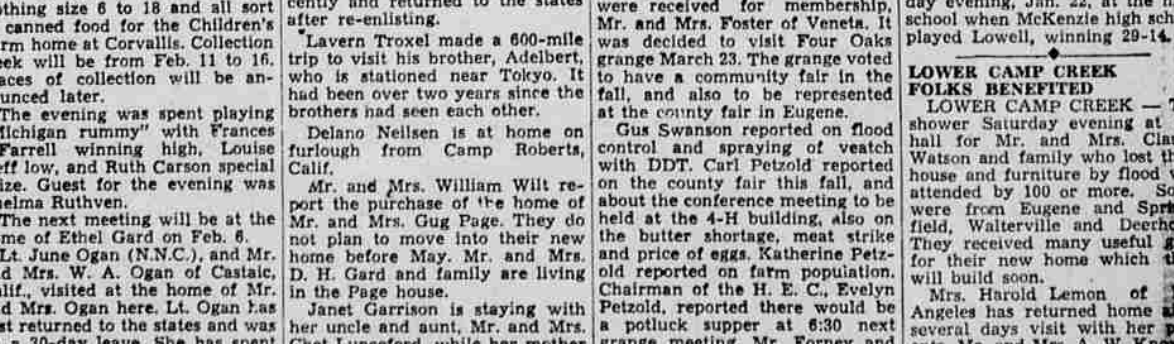
