Navy Reveals Use Of Plastic Armor

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The navy revealed that plastic body armor made of laminated glass-cloth was ready for combat use by navy and marine assault troops poised before the war's end to storm Japan.

Experiments had shown the armor to be effective against bullets and fragments.

While these glass-cloth combat jackets for ground troops go no further in wartime than a preliminary test on Okinawa, the navy said, laminated nylon flak suits were put into use by navy and marine airmen for protection from heavy anti-aircraft fire over the Japanese home islands before the surrender.

The jackets of glass-cloth, called doron, were described as lighter, more pliable and more comfortable than steel although the navy acknowledged they "at present have the disadvantage of being bulky."

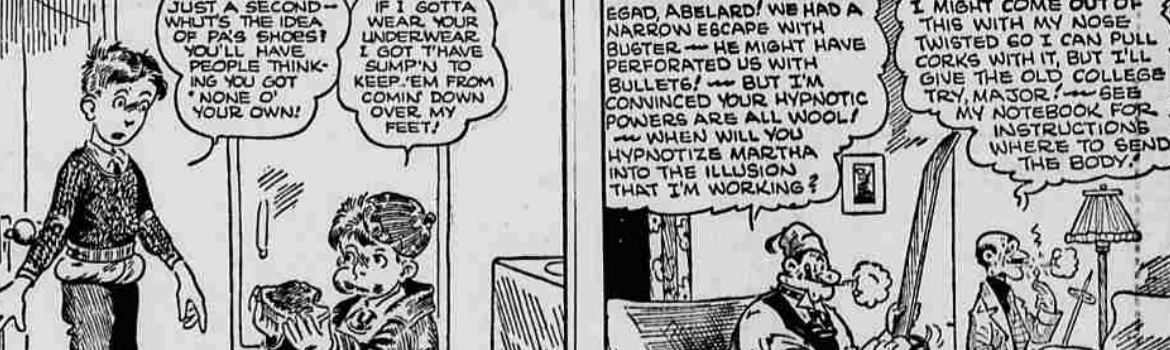
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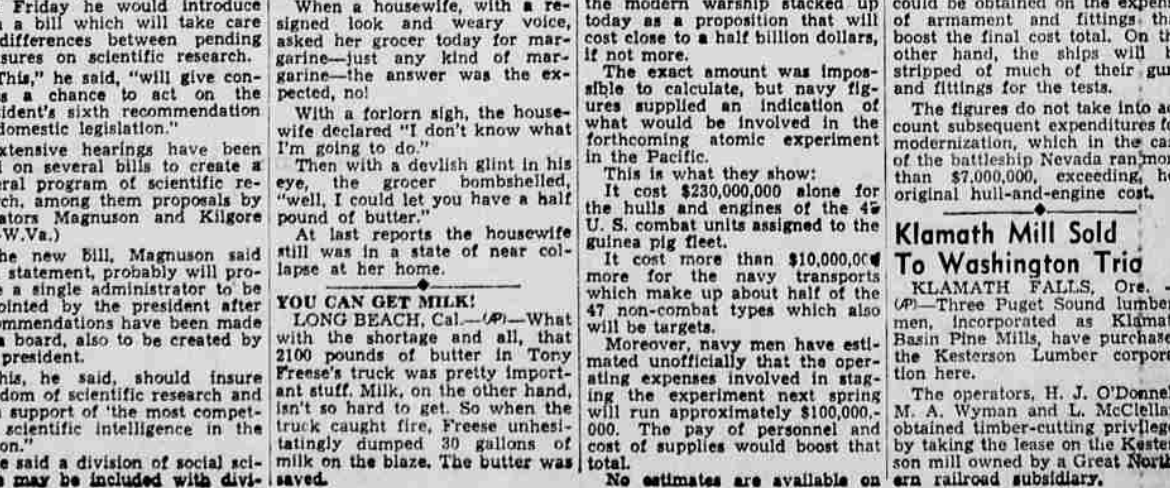

Senator Plans New Science Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26—(AP)—Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.) said Friday he would introduce soon a bill which will take care of differences between pending measures on scientific research.

"This," he said, "will give congress a chance to act on the president's sixth recommendation on domestic legislation."

Extensive hearings have been held on several bills to create a federal program of scientific research, among them proposals by Senators Magnuson and Kilgore (D-W.Va.).

The new Bill, Magnuson said in a statement, probably will propose a single administrator to be appointed by the president after recommendations have been made by a board, also to be created by the president.

This, he said, should insure freedom of scientific research and gain support of the most competent scientific intelligence in the nation."

He said a division of social science may be included with divi-

sions of mathematical, biological and other sciences.

YOU CAN GET MILK!

LONG BEACH, Cal.—(AP)—What with the shortage and all, that 2100 pounds of butter in Tony Freese's truck was pretty important stuff. Milk, on the other hand, isn't so hard to get. So when the truck caught fire, Freese unhesitatingly dumped 30 gallons of milk on the blaze. The butter was saved.

Bomb Tests To Cost Over Half-Billion

WASHINGTON—(A.P.)—The test of the A-bomb versus the modern warship stacked up today as a proposition that will cost close to a half billion dollars, if not more.

The exact amount was impossible to calculate, but navy figures supplied an indication of what would be involved in the forthcoming atomic experiment in the Pacific.

This is what they show: It cost \$230,000,000 alone for the hulls and engines of the 45 U. S. combat units assigned to the guinea pig fleet.

It cost more than \$100,000,000 for the navy transports which make up about half of the 47 non-combat types which also will be targets.

Moreover, navy men have estimated unofficially that the operating expenses involved in staging the experiment next spring will run approximately \$100,000,000. The pay of personnel and cost of supplies would boost that total.
