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North Fork Siuslaw Road Work Sought

The Lane county court heard arguments Friday from a 15-man delegation from the north fork Siuslaw district, on maintenance work to be done on the north fork road. The delegation asserted that, in a seven mile section of the road, there are 14 dangerous curves, which constitute a hazard to the lives of children traveling in the school bus.

The road, some 14 miles long, between Florence and Pawn, is badly in need of resurfacing, it was asserted, but before the resurfacing is done the curves should be eliminated, it was urged. It was pointed out that should the school bus meet a logging truck on one of the curves it might be forced off the road. The road is extensively used by logging trucks which, it was claimed, have worn deep ruts and chuck holes. A request was also made that guard rails be put up on some of the curves.

Although no action was taken by the court at the Friday session, further consideration will be given the case.

Boy Scout Charter Renewal Time Near
