

Jap Surrender Photos Stolen

TRENTON, N. J.—(AP)—Official photographic negatives of the Japanese surrender ceremony were stolen from the surrender scene battleship Missouri while she was tied up at Bayonne, N. J., last week, it was disclosed today.

New Jersey police broadcast an 11-state alarm for 26 four by five inch negatives and two cameras which the navy reported stolen from the Missouri's photographic laboratory. The photographs were made during surrender ceremonies aboard the Missouri in Tokyo bay last Sept. 3.

The Missouri left the Bayonne navy yard annex last week for Norfolk, Va. It was assumed that the belated appeal for a police alarm followed an unsuccessful investigation of the theft by naval authorities.



Hopper Appointed To Red Cross Post

Richard Hopper, Eugene, will coordinate Red Cross fund drive activities throughout Lane county, working with Calvin Smith, fund drive chairman for 1946, and will direct the campaign in county branches of the Lane county chapter, Smith announced Tuesday.

Quota for the 1946 Red Cross fund campaign for Lane county will be \$80,000, Smith announced Tuesday. Of this amount, 22 per cent will be channeled to the national organization for continuation of services to occupation troops, hospitalized servicemen and veterans, and to other programs of national scope.

The remaining 78 per cent of the sum will remain in Lane county and will be used to finance the community programs of the Lane county chapter, including service to veterans and their families and to servicemen, training courses such as home nursing, first aid, nutrition and accident prevention, disaster relief for cases involving five persons or less, and other local programs.

The national goal of the campaign, scheduled for March, will be 100,000,000.

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Rogery Kinney of Eugene was convicted in justice court late yesterday on a charge of failing to stop after an accident, for which he was fined \$15, and thereupon he was brought before City Judge C. R. Ashton, who convicted him on a drunken driving charge to which he had pleaded not guilty.

Kinney was fined \$100 in city court and suffered suspension of his driver's license for a year. The hit-and-run charge grew out of an accident five miles south of Albany on the Pacific highway, reported by Willard E. Gillett of Halsey, whose car, the court found, had been struck by Kinney's pick-up.

cheer DeGaulle on Armistice day just more than six weeks after their liberation. Not since I'd heard Atlantans cheer for rallying Georgia over Alabama had I heard cheers like Paris sent up from the heavens from its beautiful avenues that November 11. As the three progressed down the way police joined hands and held the surging thousands who finally fell into chanting "Vive DeGaulle! Vive Churchill! DeGaulle forever! Churchill forever!"

Both Deposed Now
Thinking back now, it seems strange they have both been deposed by mere politicians almost unheard of at that time.

I next almost rubbed coat tails with Churchill in parliament by the Thames. I was sitting in a corridor awaiting an opportunity to enter the House of Commons. He walked directly in front of where I was sitting, broad, so very broad and stoop-shouldered. His face was deep in political thought as he strode for a recess from the opposition who had been criticizing what had been transpiring in liberated Athens.

Within a few minutes, while in waiting room conversation with my friend, I felt eyes on me. I raised mine and looked

Snow Flurries Fall In Eugene Area

Lane county got the cold shoulder from old man winter Tuesday as a little flurry of snow fell in Eugene and outlying vicinities. The U. S. weather bureau reported that at 4:30 a. m. Tuesday two-tenths of an inch of snow had fallen in Eugene, the heaviest local snowfall since 1941. A brisk shower of hail fell at 1 p. m.

Heavy snowfalls were reported in the mountains with bad driving conditions being prevalent over most mountain roads. In the Santiam pass, 12 inches of new snow was reported, making a total of 119 inches at the summit. Odell lake had 11 inches of new snow with a total of 129 inches.

"No, no! Wait until he is through drinking!"

Speaker at these two meetings will be Frank W. Braden, assistant national director of the division of program of the Boy Scouts of America.

The annual meetings in the

southern division of the local council will be held at Coquille on Sunday, Feb. 7, and at Roseburg on Monday, Feb. 18.

Council officers will attend all four meetings to conduct the necessary council business, Bruckart said.

Patterson Stoutly Defends Army Demobilization Policy, Program

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson, stoutly defending the army's demobilization program, said he hoped that some minor overseas theaters could be evacuated completely in the next few months.

He also reported that American forces in Italy could be moved out by June 1 if a peace treaty is signed by then.

Patterson returned last week from a world tour of army bases. He emphasized that the evacuations would not reduce substantially the army's manpower requirements, now estimated at 1,500,000 by June 30. He added, however, that a slow, steady decrease could be expected after that date as overseas commitments end.

Vigorous Defense
In a vigorous defense of demobilization policies, he reported that 10,600,000 persons have served in the army since Pearl Harbor; that total strength last May was 8,300,000 and that 7,750,000 of the latter will have been returned to civilian life by June 30.

"I am willing to match that record against any armed force in the world," he said.

He disclosed that studies are underway in India, Burma, the middle east and north Africa looking toward evacuation in a matter of months. If Italy, too, is evacuated, he said, combat army force personnel based at Foggia will remain because it primarily is intended to support the occupation of Germany.

By June 30th
The June 30 estimate of 1,500,000 men, he said, is based on the closest calculations of army leaders. Less than 300,000 will be assigned to Japan and some 300,000 more will be needed in Germany. Patterson gave this schedule for paring the size of overseas forces:

Pacific forces under Gen. Douglas MacArthur—now total 875,000 and will be reduced to 375,000 by June 1. Philippine forces totalled 280,000 on Jan. 1 and will be cut to 79,000 by June 30.

Germany—Gen. Joseph T. McNarney will cut his occupation force from 622,000 on Jan. 1 to 307,000 on June 30.

China—Now 9,000 and to be reduced to 6,000.

Italy—From 51,000 on Jan. 1 to 28,000 at the end of June if a peace treaty is not signed by then.

Other Areas—Strength in India and Burma will be pared from 55,000 to 4,000 and in the Middle East from 18,000 to 5,000 unless plans are revised.

Patterson also reported that: 1. Negotiations are underway for the assignment of British empire forces to Japan to serve under MacArthur in the occupation. He said he did not know

of any plans for Russian troops to participate.

2. During the five months since V-J-day, 2,700,000 Japanese troops have been disarmed and demobilized. There still are 3,000,000 Jap soldiers overseas with only 500,000 still to be disarmed.

3. He plans to ask congress to increase the pay of Filipino scouts from 18 to 50 pesos (\$25 a month) to encourage enlistments in the U. S. army. The army hopes to enlist 50,000 but had less than 200 recruits.

4. He personally favors retaining WACS for the regular army.

SALEM, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Representatives of four flax cooperatives today urged the state board of control to stay in the flax business, opposing the Willamette Valley Flax Fibre association's recent effort to get the state out of the flax business.

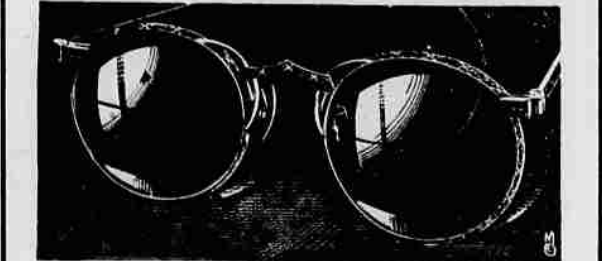
