Forest Camp Needs
Told By Officials

About \$30,000 would be re-
quired for maintenance work to put
the forest camps in the Willamette
national forests in as good shape
as they were before the outbreak
of the war, Willamette national
forest service officials in Eugene
announced Tuesday.

It would be three years, officials
added, before the work could be
completed, since it is impossible
to work on many of the camps
during the winter months. Most
of the work would be required on
five main camps, which draw the
largest number of visitors—Para-
dise forest camp, McKenzie Bridge
forest camp, Clear lake forest
camp, Trout lake forest camp and
Mossy Maple forest camp.

Rep. Stockman (R-Ore.) has
urged the house appropriations
committee to appropriate suffi-
cient funds to reestablish the camp
areas and other recreation areas
of the national forests.

Local officials of the Willamette
national forest service pointed out
Tuesday that there are more than
100 forest camps in the Willamette
national forests, in Linn county
and parts of Lane, Douglas, and
Marion counties. These camps, it
was announced, vary in size, some
drawing as few as 25 and 30 visi-
tors per year, while others attract
over 5000 visitors per year.

"It was emphasized that the \$30-
000 figure would not make any
improvements in the camps or
picnic grounds but would only
put them back in the shape they
were in before the war. Many of
the camps have been actually
closed since the outbreak of the
war because it was impossible to
get men to do the work of main-
taining the camps. Some of the
camps have deteriorated badly. It
was announced, and would re-
quire some time to repair. Tables
have rotted or become broken,
fireplaces have fallen down and
brush has grown up. Some of the
camps have modern plumbing fa-
cilities, with running water, and
many such installations are now
badly in need of repair, the of-
ficials said.

Scouts Here Urged
To Seek Award

Participation by the Oregon
Trail council, Boy Scouts of Amer-
ica, in the High Climber Award
plan has been suggested by Wal-
ter W. Whidden, deputy regional
executive, as the council's appli-
cation for a charter from the na-
tional organization was reviewed.

The award is granted by the re-
gional committee of region 11 to
any Boy Scout council which
reaches certain objectives. Appli-
cation for participation in the plan
is made following action of the
local council executive board,
Whidden explained.

In reviewing the charter appli-
cation Monday night at the Eu-
gene hotel, at a meeting attended
by chairmen of council operating
committees, council officers, and
district committee chairmen,
Whidden compared the regional
average and the council figures
with the high climber award ob-
jectives.

These objectives include provi-
sion for no more than 45 per cent
tenderfoot scouts or less than 25
per cent first class scouts camp-
ing; all scout units with at least
75 per cent of boys with 10 days
and nights in the out-of-doors; 75
per cent of units operating on the
budget plan; all meeting places
inspected for safety at least once

high school social studies teachers,

versity of Oregon school of educa-
tion, will be given, by March 7,
in 16 centers throughout the state
to benefit teachers from every
