

### Atom Explosion To Be Photographed From 100 Foot Towers

NEW YORK — (AP) — Cameras on top of 100-foot steel towers, arranged in a ring around the warships in Bikini atoll, will photograph the navy's atomic bomb tests this summer.

The cameras will be automatic, operated by remote control, by radio on a distant ship. Other cameras will take pictures from airplanes flying at safe distances. In addition, several planes operated by remote control, piloted, will carry cameras closer than the manned planes.

The arrangements were announced today with approval of the navy security office, Washington, by the Fairchild camera and instrument corporation, which will supply cameras, radio and electronic equipment for the cross roads photograph.

The tower cameras will be in batteries, set over several islands surrounding the enclosure of atoll waters. The instruments will be housed in small rooms, each shielded against x-rays and other radioactive hazards of an atomic bomb explosion. Photographic film requires better shielding than do human beings, because the emulsion is very sensitive to fogging by even a slight excess of radioactive rays.

Special pains will be taken to prevent the heat of the explosive flash from burning the film. This heat will be millions of degrees Fahrenheit. Although the cameras

on the ring of towers will be from five to ten miles distant from the exploding bomb, the sensitive film might be damaged by the hot flash.

**Seattle Police Open Probe Of Stabbing**  
SEATTLE, Jan. 31 — (AP) — Charging lack of cooperation from military authorities, Capt. Richard Mahoney of the police homicide detail said detectives started an investigation today into the stabbing of a Negro soldier here.

The soldier, Eddie Alford, 21, was stabbed in the abdomen Jan. 10, when attacked by a Negro civilian, police said. Refusing to talk to city police, he was removed to Ft. Lawton hospital, where he died Tuesday. Mahoney said the army neglected to inform him of Alford's condition.

James M. Tipton, 81, of route 2, Springfield, died at Salem Tuesday. He was born Feb. 5, 1864, in North Carolina, and married Nora Birch at Haysville, N. C., in 1895. She died in 1919. He has been a resident of Springfield since 1916, and a member of the Marcola Christian church. In 1923 he married Carrie Stephens in Eugene, and she preceded him in death in 1941.

Surviving are the following children: Gus H. Tipton, of Vallejo, Cal.; Margaret Stringer of San Pablo, Cal.; George Tipton of Springfield; Rueben Tipton of Halfway, Ore.; Anna Mae Tipton of Eugene; and nine grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at the Poole-Larsen mortuary Friday at 10 a. m., with interment in the family plot at Camp Creek cemetery.

### Eugenean Still Hopes Seattle Baby His

Still hoping to find his missing baby, Kenneth E. Switzer of 327 High street was awaiting word from Seattle Thursday on identification of an infant found in a hotel wash room there. He has sent a description of his baby to Seattle authorities and hopes to hear soon whether it fits the youngster there.

A picture of the Seattle infant received by The Register-Guard was examined Thursday by Switzer. He said that the two infants are of comparable size and build but that the features in the picture were not familiar to him. He has not seen his baby since November, he said. Seattle police are trying to locate the mother of the baby there.

Plans to put the child on a special radio broadcast over station KOMO at 4:45 p. m. Thursday were cancelled when the baby was taken to a Seattle hospital for treatment of an inflamed neck gland. Hospital attendants reported his condition good.

### Clare B. Luce Aiming For Senate Post

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Glamorous Rep. Clare Boothe Luce, R. Conn., the "it" girl of congress and coiner of such idioms as "globaloney," revealed that she won't run for re-election this year. But she may reach for even greater heights—a seat in the womanless United States senate.

The blonde congresswoman chose to be mysterious and "keep 'em guessing" as to her future plans after she announced that she would not be a candidate for re-election.

"My good and sufficient reasons for this decision will become abundantly clear in time, she said. She refused to confirm or deny that she intends to run for the senate seat to be vacated by Thomas C. Hart, R., Conn.

**Discusses Future**  
She had luncheon with House Republican Leader Joseph W. Martin of Massachusetts and presumably discussed her political future.

Mrs. Luce, an author and playwright of note before she came to congress in January, 1943, recently turned down a movie offer to co-star with George Raft in "The Congresswoman."

Political observers have reported that 42-year-old Clare Luce is eyeing the senate seat which Hart, a retired naval admiral, said he will relinquish because he will be 69 this summer and feels that "men of too advanced age" should not remain in the senate.

Mrs. Luce recently announced that she would support Connecticut's Republican governor, Raymond Baldwin, for the senate. But he said in Hartford that he would quit politics at the end of his present term. This apparently leaves the way clear for Mrs. Luce, and observers here believe that she will run for senator if she thinks her chances of election are good.

### Portland Gridders Slate Hawaii Games

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31 — (AP) — The University of Portland's planned return to 1946 football for the first time since a wartime halt, was boosted additionally Thursday with the announcement that the Portland football squad will travel to Hawaii next December to play the champions of the island alumni league on Dec. 14 and the University of Hawaii on Dec. 21.

Hal Moe, Portland athletic director and football mentor, said the Hawaiian all-stars would return the compliment by appearing in Portland on Sept. 26 against the Pilots. He said the University of Hawaii had agreed to a home-and-home arrangement, whereby the island collegians will play Portland here in the fall of 1947.

Attending to the university's all-out return to football, Moe disclosed the school had booked autumn contests with St. Mary's, Oregon State, Idaho, and possibly Santa Clara university.
