

## Health Officials Fear That GI's With Malaria In Dormant Stage Threaten Spread Of Epidemic

SEATTLE, Wash.—(U.P.)—Fear that thousands of GI's, discharged from the armed forces but still afflicted with dormant malaria, will build malarial "reservoirs" threatening spread of the disease next year throughout west coast and southern states was voiced here by state health authorities.

Terming malaria the "most dangerous" disease imported into the United States during the course of the war, state health officials predicted that threat of widespread domestic epidemics will not crystallize until next summer during the breeding season of the anopheline mosquito, carrier of malaria-infected parasites.

"Nearly ever community, no matter how small, in the United States can expect to have these human reservoirs," state epidemiologist Dr. Walvin R. Geidt said. "Health officials in this teeming port city who kept alert watch for carriers of strange Pacific diseases throughout the war, checking returning veterans, quarantining shipments of tropical plant life, and even fumigating mail shipments, urged nationwide vigil against the disease."

"Jungle rot, yellow fever, bubonic plague, typhus, liver flukes, leprosy, and dengue fever are no longer a source of much worry to doctors in the states. Malaria is a definite threat," Geidt said. "Thousands of GI's who were infected with malaria while fighting overseas have returned to the United States, most having taken atabrine which served to suppress the disease. Many have received their discharges but still carry the disease in dormant form."

Geidt said that in many areas, particularly in states having cold climates, the disease lacking favorable conditions for its spread via mosquito would burn itself out within three years.

"But in states where anopheles mosquitoes breed in warmer climates such as in the Willamette valley of Oregon, where the disease was endemic or chronic even before the war, and in other southern states where the retest concentration is great, the danger will reach its peak next summer," he said.

Federal health authorities handling malaria control in war areas during peak production conducted surveys in many states, Geidt said, but state officials have not been informed of any federal plans to attack the disease by stamping out mosquito-breeding grounds.

"After the Spanish-American war and the first world war, many malarial veterans returned to their homes, but the disease failed to take hold. This time the problem is greater," he said. The state health department, along with federal and state officials in Oregon, have conducted their own research throughout the war.

"And even though it is common belief now that most of the servicemen are home or are on the way that the war is over from the medical standpoint, instead our work will increase," he said.

## State Income Tax Man Will Assist In Eugene

An auditor from the office of the state income tax collector in Salem will be in Eugene at the courthouse to assist Lane county people prepare their returns in February.

Dates he will be available, free of charge, will include: Feb. 4-9, Feb. 13-21, and Feb. 25-March 2. Office hours will be 8:30 to 5 on weekdays, with noon closing on Saturdays.

All single persons, or anyone not living with husband or wife, earning a net income from all sources of over \$800 for the taxable year, must file returns. Married couples with a net income of more than \$1500 a year are also "eligible."

Deadline for filing of returns is April 15.

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## Friends Pay Tribute To Miss Sue Badollet

The death Tuesday of Miss Sue L. Badollet, 84, brought reminiscent thoughts to minds of many friends among older residents of the city, and especially to those who had known the little French woman in the 16 years she spent on the campus as a house mother.

Miss Badollet was born Feb. 2, 1861, at Lawrenceville, Ill., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vigo Badollet. The family was French, with a Spanish heritage.

For 37 years Miss Badollet had been principal of one of the schools at Council Bluffs, Iowa, before she retired from the teaching field and came to Eugene. Her brother, Frank, was an instructor in the school of music here, and they made their home together until his death. Miss Badollet took a position as house mother, first with Kappa Omicron, then with Alpha Chi Omega, where she remained for a long period, and later with Phi Mu, where she remained until stricken with creeping paralysis, which made further retirement necessary.

At the time of this affliction, she remarked to a friend, "I am so strong and well otherwise, I suppose I shall live on for years." She had lived for 12 years, steadily maintaining a patient dignity, and in spite of her handicap keeping to the niceties of gentle living, according to her friends.

In 1888, Miss Badollet became a member of the PEO sisterhood, and the 50th anniversary of her initiation was observed here by Chapter H, with which she had affiliation. Her diary of a trip to Europe in 1924, when she visited France, Italy, Switzerland, Belgium, Holland, England and Scotland, is the treasured property of one of her friends in Eugene. She was a member of the Episcopal church, and had received communion each month during her retirement. She had been a resident of Sunset Home for more than five years, residing in private homes prior to that time.

Sole survivor is one brother, Perry Badollet of San Francisco. Private funeral services were arranged.

## Warning On License Deadline Issued

Police Chief L. L. Pittenger Thursday issued warning about four kinds of licenses which must be obtained immediately or in the near future: bicycle, dog, rooming house and hotel, and second-hand store licenses.

Bicycle licenses must be purchased by March 1; they cost 25 cents.

Dog licenses, if not purchased before March 1, will cost an additional dollar apiece. Present rates are: for males and spayed females, \$1; for females, \$1.50. After March, 25 cents is added to the dollar for each month the purchaser is late.

Applications for rooming house and hotel licenses and for second-hand store licenses are due now, and applications should be filed at once so they may be brought up for approval at the next city council meeting, Feb. 11, Pittenger advised. The premises of each applicant must be inspected by city police, fire and health departments, which make recommendations to the council.

Applications may be made at the city recorder's office.

## Junior High Canteen Slated
