Recipe

Vegetable Soup with Meat Balls
 (Serves 4-6)

One slice bread, 1/2 pound chopped meat, small minced onion, 1 egg, salt, pepper, 1/2 teaspoon curry powder, 4 tablespoons fortified margarine, 1 can vegetable soup, 2 cans water, 1 sliced onion, 1 sliced turnip, carrot or parsnip, minced parsley.

Soften bread in a little water; squeeze dry. Add meat, minced onion, 1 egg, salt, pepper and curry powder. Mix well. Shape into small balls. Brown in melted margarine in large saucepan. Add vegetable soup and water; bring to boiling. Add sliced onion, and any fresh vegetable such as turnip, carrot, parsnip (or even a handful of green beans), thinly sliced. Cook just long enough to soften vegetables. Add a little minced parsley just before serving.

Book Review

"The Bible and the Common Reader," Mary Ellen Chase; Macmillan, 1945; \$2.50.

Mary Ellen Chase, for some years professor of English at Smith college, and author of "Mary Peters," "Silas Crockett," "Windswept" and other novels is called a "distinguished writer and a superb stylist." This book is rated by critics as "a great book about the greatest of all books, and introduces us to the profound depths of human interest, the glorious literature of the Bible."

The book is written for "the common reader. It explains what the Bible is; the story of the evolution of our King James translation; a brief history of the Hebrew people, their traits and characteristics; the various types of its literature presented to their times, and the incidents which produced them; the greatest personalities of the Bible and its imperishable beauty."

It is dedicated to Miss Chase's pupils, the students at Smith college who have enjoyed with her the reading and the study of the King James Bible, and especially to four students who worked for honors in that subject. Miss Chase has "taken more delight in the Bible than in any other book." She has become convinced that too few people know how to read it. For years she has given a course in the King James version: "a library of history, poetry, biography, drama, fables, oracles and narratives, to name a few." She speaks of "two philosophers, both of whom give us in mingled prose and poetry their questions and their conclusions concerning the meaning of life and the ways of God with men: the unknown authors of the books of Ecclesiastes and Job; one a skeptic, the other a tortured man of faith."

She closes her introductory chapter with a quotation from a writer in the Apocrypha who "prayed and understanding was given me... I called upon God and the spirit of wisdom was given me... I loved her (wisdom) above health and beauty, and chose to have her instead of light; for the light that cometh from her never

goeth out. All good things together came to me with her, and innumerable riches in her hands. For she is a treasure unto men that never faileth; which they use and become the friends of God." (From the 11th chapter of the Wisdom of Solomon, the Apocrypha.)

The author calls attention to the fact that the Bible is a book of suffering. The Hebrews lacked many of the gifts and accomplishments of contemporary races and civilizations, she remarks, yet in their suffering they "were positive, even prodigal, all their anguish of soul and spirit did not quench their spirit or deaden their soul." The race is "possessed of an unquenchable, innate sense of life springing up within them. Hebrew eyes seem always to have been open and Hebrew ears sensitive to the manifold and free gifts of the world about them."

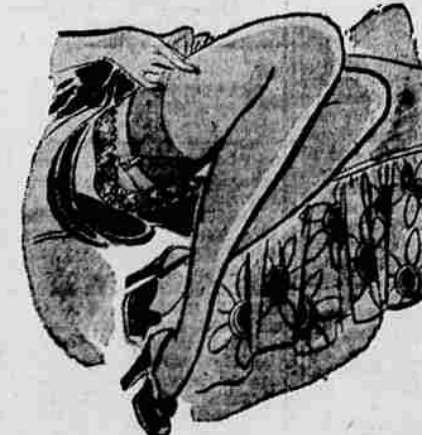
