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McNarney Says Germans Criticizing Allied Occupation Policies

BERLIN—(AP)—The Germans are becoming more outspoken in their criticism of allied occupation policies, Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, U. S. commander in Germany, declared, but their behavior thus far has been better than expected, perhaps because of an exceptionally mild winter.

The problem of displaced persons has become so acute, however, that McNarney, in his monthly report for December, urged immediate intergovernmental action to take off American hands more than 250,000 persons who are stateless or otherwise unable to return to their homes.

Most German criticism, the American military governor said, could be traced to a "general feeling of self-pity on the part of the Germans, who irrationally expected the allies must take care of them."

Hanford Atom Head Resigns Position

RICHLAND, Wash.—(AP)—A 30-year-old engineer, Col. Frederick J. Clarke, will take charge of the Hanford atomic bomb materials plant January 31, succeeding Col. Franklin T. Matthias, who has directed the project since its inception.

Colonel Matthias, 37, is leaving the army on the same date to take a position as manager of a hydro-electric project of the Sao Paulo Tramway Light & Power Company, Ltd., in Brazil.

The new Hanford project director has been with the army service forces' headquarters staff in Washington, D. C., since 1942. Previously he was with the 38th engineers at Fort Jackson, Miss., and also served on Ascension island in the South Atlantic.

The Hanford project still is in full operation, with just under 5,000 workers. A reduction from the wartime roll of 6,000 employees was made possible by improved methods, a spokesman said.
