ment for shock and bruises, and
Mrs. Hilda King, Stockton, Calif.,
was released late Tuesday.

The 37-passenger bus, which
plopped on its left side at the edge
of the highway after skidding in a
traffic slowdown, was righted and
towed into Eugene late Tues-
day afternoon. It was not seri-
ously damaged.

Fifteen passengers and the driver
escaped serious injury in the
accident.
