Forum Told Business Cooperation Vital In Improving Education

Immediate and thorough cooperation between businessmen and educators for improvement of the nation's education system is vital to the future of both, declared Paul H. Good, head of the United States chamber of commerce forum Wednesday noon.

Stressing his point—the better the education the higher the standard of living—Good showed slides of charts which related the level of educational attainment and retail sales in the 48 states.

The fact that the allies have attained victory over the axis does not mean that this country will "live happily ever after," Good declared, pointing out that there must be continued fight against poverty, ignorance and insecurity.

The schools, he said, are the training-grounds for the manpower and womanpower which must fight this battle.

A lesson to be learned from the present war, Good said, is the necessity for working together. He pointed to the high rate of rejections of men for the armed forces because of mental and educational deficiencies as an indication of the great need for improvement in the schools. And, he added, mental and educational fitness are as important in times of peace as in war for the country's progress.

Educators and businessmen should plan together to attain a higher standard of living, the speaker asserted, explaining that he did not mean that businessmen should have anything to do with administration in the schools, but that they should help to make employment of better teachers and installation of better equipment and curriculum possible.

The great difference in educational levels in this country, from the low standard of some southern states to the high record of such states as Utah, is relatively the same difference as exists in the volume of retail sales, the circulation of national magazines and other fields which indicate standard of living, Good declared. Sixty-seven-year-old J. H. Cannon, 242 Madison street, was recovering in Sacred Heart hospital Thursday from injuries suffered shortly after midnight when he was hit by a car and thrown 45 feet.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Sixth and Olive streets at 12:17 a. m. Thursday. Jerry Gilbert Runey, 383 Park avenue, driver of the car, told city police he was driving about 20 miles an hour when he saw the pedestrian. Presuming he would wait, the motorist delayed applying his brakes, police were informed. Wheels of his machine, police said, skidded 35 feet before contact with the man and 35 feet afterward. It was raining at the time.

Cannon sustained cuts and bruises and is suffering from shock.

349 Died In Oregon Traffic During 1945

SALEM — (AP) — Traffic accidents took 349 lives in Oregon during 1945, an increase of 42 per cent over the 1944 toll of 245. Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., said today.

Vehicle-pedestrian accidents claimed the heaviest toll with 119 pedestrians killed during 1945, an increase of 58 per cent over the 1944 pedestrian fatalities.

Railroad grade crossing accidents were fatal to 14; eight bicycle riders were killed.

Sixty-seven per cent of the total fatalities occurred in rural areas.

State Income Tax Man Holds Consultations At Lane Courthouse

J. T. Sundet, a representative of the state income tax commission, is in Eugene from Salem to help advise citizens on filing their taxes, due by April 15.

He maintains his consultation service on the second floor of the county courthouse from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily, except Saturdays, when he finishes at noon. Sundet will be in Eugene for the remainder of February. He has warned his visit will be the last, as no other representative will be sent in April, as in the past.

Any single person with an annual income of more than \$750 or a married person with an income of \$1500 is subject to making a return for the state tax.

Rail Car Shortage Holds Relief Cargoes

PORTLAND, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Ten grain ships are due to load in the Columbia river ports, but because of the car shortage on western railroads they may be delayed as long as two weeks, the war shipping administration said here today.

H. E. Sanford, head of a WSA expediting committee, reported one ship was under grain spouts, but delay in movement of grain to port elevators would not permit loading of others already here or due soon.

The grain shipments are bound for China, Great Britain and France, he said.
