Recipe

Potatoes Baked in a Mold
4 large potatoes
1/2 teaspoon salt
Freshly ground black pepper
Butter or margarine

Peel and wash potatoes, then mince very fine. Drain and dry in a clean towel. Season with salt and pepper. Butter a round mold or baking dish and arrange potatoes in it in layers with butter or margarine between each layer. Fill the mold two-thirds full. Place a tablespoon of butter or margarine on top and bake in a hot oven for 40 to 45 minutes. Test by inserting a small knife. When potatoes are soft, they are done. When ready, invert the mold on to the serving dish. The potatoes should be golden brown all around and on top.
