Dr. Radin Scores Japanese Removals

Removal of Japanese-Americans from the west coast after the outbreak of the war was one of the worst mistakes ever made in the history of the United States, Dr. Max Radin, professor of law in the University of California, said Thursday evening on the University of Oregon campus in a talk sponsored by the university lectures committee.

"We took a step downward when we dealt with the problem as a racial one," Dr. Radin declared. "It is time we retraced that step and got back to real Americanism."

Answering the argument raised by many that the evacuation was necessary because of "danger of sabotage," the educator pointed out that there was not a single case of espionage by American-born Japanese.

Not Based On Fact
None of the stories of the part Japanese-Americans were said to have played in the preparation for the attack by Japan were based on fact, and this was confirmed by Edgar Hoover, FBI chief who investigated the reports, Dr. Radin said.

The lawyer emphasized that American-born Japanese remained loyal to the United States, even under most difficult circumstances. The first beachheads at Salerno and Anzio, he said, were made by Japanese-American forces, and in one Japanese unit alone, casualties were 87 per cent.

Dr. Radin also said gross injustices were perpetrated on the Japanese when they were removed to relocation centers. Often, he said, they were bullied into disposing of property for inadequate sums, and those who rented homes returned to find them badly wrecked. He added that there was sometimes deliberate looting of possessions of the Japanese by Americans.

"Damage To Ourselves"
"The real damage we did to ourselves," he said, "not to the Japanese. We completely depreciated the notion of American citizenship."

The majority of the American people were not in favor of the evacuation, Dr. Radin believes, but powerful pressure groups forced the removal.

"The entire relocation was unwarranted and should never have taken place," he stated. "No emergency, either in April, 1942, or at any time after that, justified the imprisonment and segregation for three years of the Japanese, or the destroying of their businesses."

Army Reveals That 580,000 Fathers Will Be Discharged

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The army revealed that all but 120,000 of the present 700,000 soldier-fathers will be discharged by July 1, but it cannot meet congressional recommendations for releasing all by that date unless assured sufficient replacements.

Its position was set forth by Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson in a letter to the senate military affairs committee, whose demobilization subcommittee had called for the release of all drafted fathers by July 1.

"The flat proposal to discharge fathers on or before July 1 without regard to the availability of replacements endangers the proper performance of the job of the army at that time," he said.

Patterson said the war department cannot consider releasing all drafted fathers unless the rate of replacements exceeds present expectations. The army will need 400,000 replacements before July 1 to achieve the 1,500,000-man army planned for then.

Happy to Appear
"If the moment arrives when we have the assurance that our 400,000 target of inflow will be exceeded, we will be more than

happy to appear before the military affairs committee to discuss the matter of additional criteria to be applied to the demobilization process," he wrote. "This includes the problem of separating the remaining 120,000 fathers."

The subcommittee had recommended legislation to back up its demobilization suggestion—including release of all fathers by July 1—if the army did not order them into effect.

Patterson pointed out that the problem is one of selecting between fathers and others, "some of whom will have had considerable length of service, including actual combat service."

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, chief of staff, revealed recently that the present army force includes 700,000 fathers.

The army announced Tuesday that 5,702,000 soldiers have been released since V-E day. Navy discharges since V-J day total 1,533,036, marine corps 226,181, and coast guard 80,500.

Patterson told the committee that the army does not have 2,000,000 "surplus" men as stated by the subcommittee.

Marston Returns As Forester Here

Charles Marston, for the past several years manager of the Clemons Tree Farm at Grays Harbor, and long active in logging and forestry circles in Oregon, has retired as Clemons manager and moved to Eugene where he will engage in a private forestry practice.

Marston was stationed at Eugene for 1941 and 1942 with the West Coast Lumbermen's association as Oregon forester and has been at Clemons since then. He owns a home on the McKenzie river near McKenzie river bridge, where he will live. He was with Clark and Wilson Lumber company in northwestern Oregon for many years.
