All citizens of Eugene or Lane county who have ideas they would like to submit to broaden safety practice have been invited by the organization to submit their suggestions by mail to Box 1, Eugene. Ford Hand has been named vice chairman of the council and Clarence Grohng will serve as secretary.

Troops Homebound After Quarantine

SEATTLE, Feb. 8.—(U.P.)—Quarantined overnight after a case of smallpox was discovered aboard the troopship Hermitage which docked here from Nagoya Feb. 4, 1,800 army veterans were en route to separation centers today, officials said.

Quarantine of the vessel was lifted at 1 p.m. the following day, officials said, and military passengers were immediately discharged.

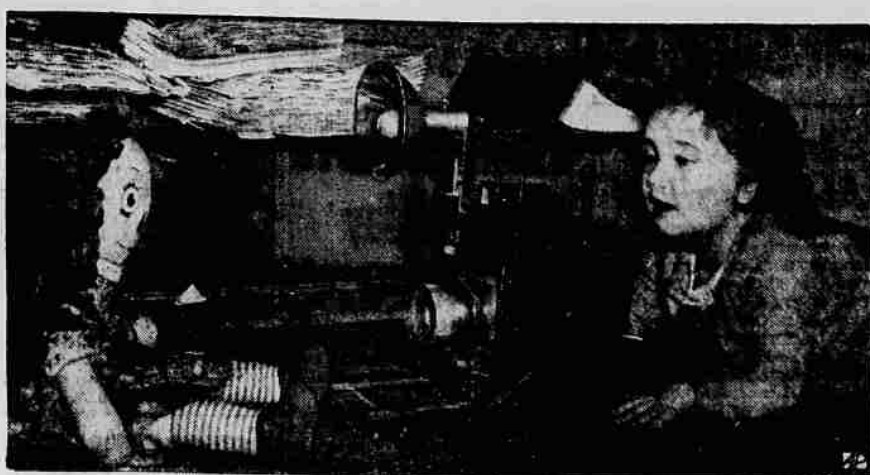

Business Prospects For 1946 Discussed

Prospects in Oregon for 1946 for the industries of shipbuilding, aluminum, lumbering, building, construction and agriculture are discussed by Dr. Wesley C. Ballaine, associate professor of business administration in the University of Oregon, in an article in the January issue of Oregon Business Review.

It is difficult to predict the level of economic activity in Oregon during 1946, Dr. Ballaine writes, because in its present state of industrial development, Oregon is primarily a producer of raw materials that are consumed elsewhere. However, many economic forces are at work within the state which may substantially modify the repercussions of outside developments, he says.

Reconversion problems do not loom as large in Oregon as in other Pacific coast states because the war industries are concentrated in Portland, thus limiting the industrial reconversion to a small portion of the state, Dr. Ballaine points out.

Men in the American aluminum industry are faced with the problem of a serious overcapacity under present market conditions, asserts the writer. He suggests as a possible solution an heroic increase in the use of aluminum, a decrease in capacity, or a combination of the two.

Normally the great bulk of Oregon's manufactures is produced by industries using forest products as raw materials, and although this dominance was equalled and surpassed by war industries from 1942 to 1945, the forest industries have already resumed their top rank, Dr. Ballaine writes. There appears to be considerable interest in the expansion of manufacturing such articles as sashes, doors, furniture, and prefabricated structures.

Shortages of manpower and materials during the latter part of 1945 seriously handicapped the building and construction industry, but there seems no doubt that the expansion in this field during 1946 will be great, he says. The rise in building costs will act as somewhat of a damper, however, Dr. Ballaine believes.

The high level of activity maintained in agriculture during the war will probably be maintained, he says, the exact volume depending to a considerable degree on the weather. Other Oregon industries which Dr. Ballaine expects to flourish during this year are the tourist trade and gold mining.

'Ike' Will Fly To Inspect Facilities

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(U.P.)—The war department has announced that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, chief of staff, soon will inspect numerous army camps, bases and hospitals.

Eisenhower will leave Washington by plane Feb. 14. His itinerary includes: Feb. 19, McChord Field, Tacoma, Wash.; Feb. 20, Fort Lewis and Madigan general hospital, Tacoma; Feb. 21, Letterman general hospital, San Francisco.

Hungarian Fascist Charged With Treason

BUDAPEST, Hungary.—(U.P.)—Ferenc Szalasi, Hungarian Fascist leader, admitted at his war crimes trial yesterday that he sacrificed a million Hungarian soldiers to prolong the war because he believed a new German wonder-weapon would defeat the allies.

The weapon, he said, was a "turbo-Jaeger airplane which would fly without gasoline."

Szalasi, who seized power in Hungary and prevented Regent Nicholas Horthy from signing a truce with the allies Oct. 15, 1944, is charged with high treason.
