Recipe

Cabbage Soup with Cheese

6 bouillon cubes
6 cups boiling water
2 cups shredded cabbage
3/4 cup chopped onion
3/4 cup chopped carrot
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
6 tablespoons grated dry cheese

Dissolve bouillon cubes in water. Add cabbage, onion, carrot, salt and pepper. Cover and simmer for one hour. Pour into soup bowls. Sprinkle each serving with one tablespoon of grated cheese and a dash of paprika. Makes six large servings.
