 Announced as an "All-American" program, the entire group of chorus offerings are from the works of American composers. The group offered by the orchestra returns to the classical.
 "Cradle Song" by John Alden Carpenter, R. Nathaniel Dett's "Let Us Cheer the Weary Traveler," "Stars with Little Gold Sandals" by William Berwald and "White Birch in the Rain" by Clarence Loomis will be offered by the chorus.
 The incidental solos of the chorus offering of "The Farmer's Son," dramatic poem by John Tasker Howard, will be sung by James McMullen, Junction City, baritone and Robert Wardwell, Crescent Lake, tenor.
 The orchestra, under the direction of John H. Stehn, assistant professor of music, will play "Romantic Overture" by Franz Schubert, and the "Prelude to Die Meistersinger" by Richard Wagner.
 Feature of the program will be the final number in which the choral union and the orchestra present the colorful songs from "Drum Taps" by Howard Hanson. The first of this group is "Beat! Beat!
