

Oregon Population Up 10 Per Cent In Five Years

PORTLAND—(U.P.)—A population gain of 10 per cent was registered by Oregon in the period 1940 to 1945, figures released by the census bureau showed today.

During the same period Washington was gaining 20.3 per cent. The bureau pointed out, however, that these figures included members of the armed forces stationed in the two states and did not include legal residents who were serving in the armed forces outside the states.

Net civilian gain for Oregon amounted to 9.7 per cent while that for Washington was 12.8 per cent.

Total 1945 population figures, including service men stationed in the states and not those serving elsewhere, were Washington, 2,088,574; and Oregon, 1,206,322. Estimated civilian populations were 1,953,725 for Washington and 1,193,702 for Oregon.

As early as 1941, 94 out of every 100 British men aged 14 to 64 had been mobilized.

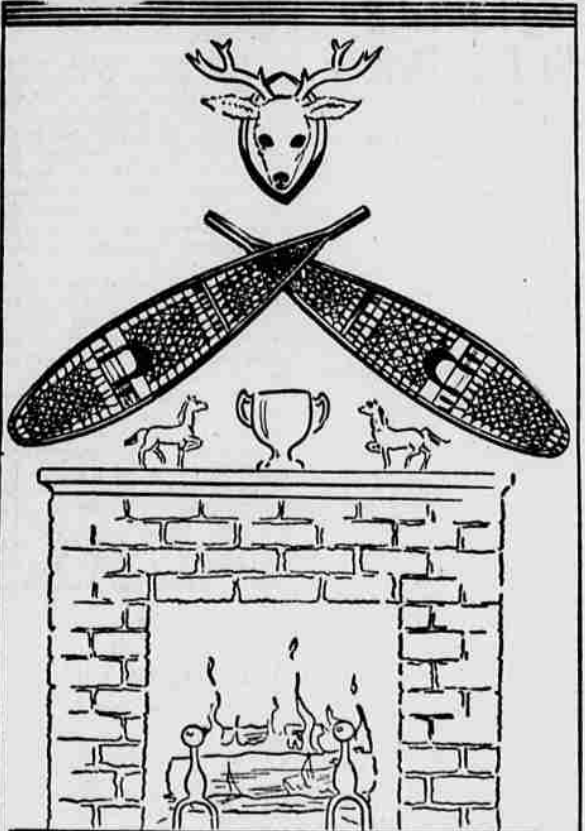

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Building Trades Will Discuss Wage Scale

Discussion of the wage scale and overtime pay for Saturday work will be main business topics Wednesday at 8 p. m. at a meeting of the Eugene Building-Trades Council, Room 204, Labor Temple.

The council still has had no reply on its application to the national wage adjustment board on a 20-cents-an-hour wage raise for all its members. The carpenters local Monday was informed that its raise had been approved, but to date no other local has received like notice. The application, made in October, sought to raise to \$1.15 an hour the rate for building laborers, with more advanced skills on a comparatively higher scale. Ray McInnis, secretary of the council, said that effort is being made to establish a uniform wage scale throughout the state in order that contractors will know the rates in each community.

tion of atomic bomb espionage. It said its policy has been not to interfere with any FBI investigation involving any foreign power.

Meanwhile, Sen. Brien McMahon (D, Conn.) chairman of the Senate's Atomic Committee, refused reports that committee hearings had brought about leaks of vital bomb information. He said he had been reassured in this respect by Secretary of War Robert L. Patterson and Maj. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, chief of the army's atomic bomb project.

Army sources nevertheless stood firm on their claims that "multiple leaks" had resulted from testimony of scientists before the committee and from public utterances of atomic experts.

Groves is known to feel that the United States in recent months has lost more security on the bomb than during the wartime development period when it was a top secret. This view was shared by Sen. Edwin C. Johnson (D, Colo.) member of the Senate atomic committee.

Johnson attributed the leaks to "an organized effort to make public as many of the atomic secrets as possible."

These views were expressed while the Canadian government pushed its investigations of the alleged communist espionage ring.

Chaplain Irked By Press Reports

SEATTLE—(U.P.)—Army Chaplain Rev. Frederick A. McDonald of Seattle was back here from the war theaters today with a "gripe."

"Perhaps," he said, "it's because I've been in the army so long, but I want to lodge a gripe with the press."

The chaplain pointed out that reports of U. S. soldiers having friction with European civilians are mostly "blown up out of all proportion to their importance."

"A few small incidents of hot heads getting out of hand have been overplayed. Our men get along pretty well wherever they are," he said.

Chaplain McDonald, now a major, left his last assignment at the Biarritz American University in Southern France on Jan. 15.

The proposed sustained yield program on lands of the Oregon and California Revested Lands Administration and its effect on the Blachly community, smaller lumber operators and the tax structure will be discussed starting at 8 p. m. Friday at an open meeting in the Blachly school gymnasium.

Harry Nettleton, Portland, forester in charge of research and information for the O and C, and Otto C. Krueger, in charge of the Eugene area, will be speakers. The meeting is sponsored by the Blachly Parent-Teacher Assn., of which Mrs. Carroll Hult is president.

Because the Blachly community has a large amount of O and C timber land, residents there are vitally interested in the program, and in distribution of the county's share of O and C funds, points out Julius Hult of the Hult Lumber Co. at Horton. One of the main questions to be raised will be the prospect of obtaining more of the funds for use by the schools in the county. Since 1937, Hult says, when a change in the law was effected, the schools have benefited little from the revenues of these lands in their own communities.

News that the University of Oregon has been allotted 469 dormitory units by the Federal Public Housing Administration at Seattle was confirmed Tuesday in a telegram to The Register-Guard by Congressman Harris Ellsworth, from Washington, D. C.

Fruit Growers Will Meet On Saturday

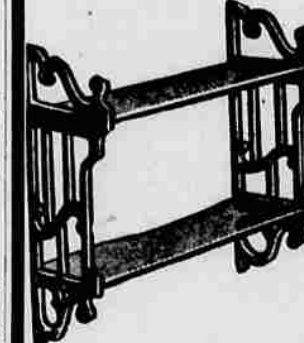

THE HAGUE—(U.P.)—Prime Minister Schermerhorn has paid this column the compliment of asking it to perform a friendly mission for Holland by emphasizing to America his assurances that not only his government but the people of The Netherlands as a whole are anxious to see Indonesia gain self government and within a fixed period freedom of choice for its own status.

This is by way of being a historic request, for it is indeed a striking recognition of the great politico-social tide which is sweeping our world.

Here it may be useful to interpolate that Dr. Schermerhorn has a wide reputation for being a humanitarian. He abandoned a college professorship to enter politics. During the war he led a free Dutch underground movement and the Germans had him in a concentration camp for a couple of years. Recently he joined the socialistic labor party. Still in his sunny years, he is a man of strong personality and direct speech. More than incidentally, he has a big and captivating smile, which must be a great asset to him in making friends.

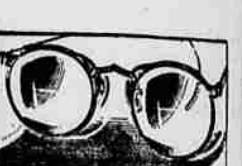
