Her widower is connected with the Eugene Plywood Co. and is one of the founders of the Olympia Veneer Co. of Olympia. Mrs. Johnson was a member of the Order of Runeberg of Olympia and Sons of Norway of Eugene.

Surviving, besides her widower, are a daughter, Mrs. Ellen Sanderson of Eugene; a sister, Mrs. Kristina Tors of Eureka, Calif.; and a brother, Gus Frans of Alaska.
