See the Curse of Drink in all its sordidness," urged the handbills which have flooded downtown Eugene during the past week, publicizing in authentic period fashion the Very Little Theatre production of "Ten Nights in a Bar-Room," which opens Saturday evening at the Fairgrounds "Operahouse," under the direction of George Hebert.

Hebert, who was associated with the Portland Civic Theatre for a number of years, has assembled a cast of VLT favorites, including as feminine members who in one way or another bear the brunt of alcoholic evils, Adele Griffith as Mrs. Morgan; Laura Nidever as Mrs. Morgan; the drunkard's wife; Marie Kenney as Little Mary Morgan, the drunkard's angelic daughter. . . . literally angelic for the child is murdered in the play by an ill-aimed blow meant for her sordid father; and Dorothy Parks Scott as Mehitabel Cartwright.

Bid Made for Larger War Widow Benefits

PORTLAND (AP)—Widows and dependents of men killed in the war are being neglected while labor unions and government workers get pay increases, the national commander of the Disabled American Veterans asserted here.

Dow V. Walker, Newport, declared in an interview that the bereaved relatives receive only a small pension, but purchasing power is steadily declining.

He called the totally disabled veteran with a family a "forgotten man," who gets \$115 a month and "can't live on that amount of money. . . our organization is asking that additional dependency benefits be granted, as they are in Canada."

Walker defended Gen. Omar Bradley, criticized by the national American Legion commander, and said he "is doing a bang-up job."
