The next meeting will be on "Main Dish Meals." Mrs. Gibbins and Mrs. Patton will be project leaders.

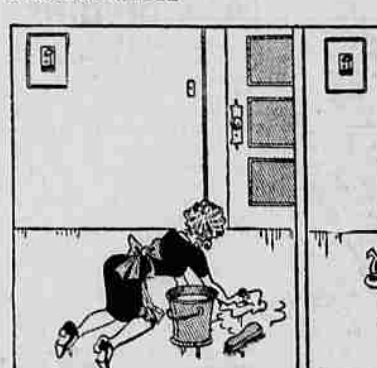
CRESWELL MAN DIES

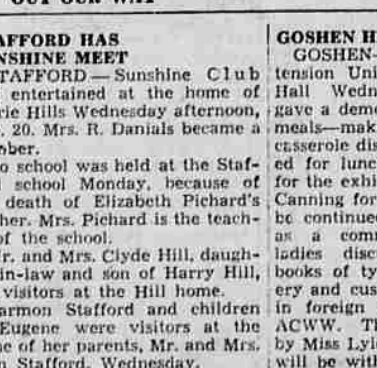

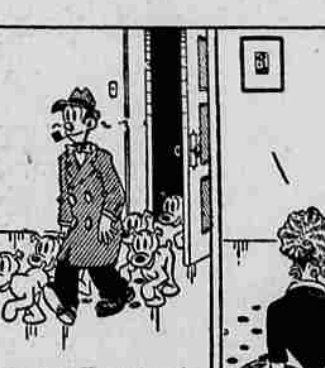

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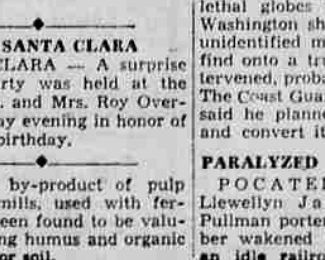
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
